



On January 20, 2021, Rotary District Governors in North Carolina virtually presented North Carolina Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Mandy Cohen, her husband and two children the prestigious Paul Harris Fellow recognition in honor of her leadership in the area of disease prevention and treatment, a core area of focus of Rotary International.

District 7730 Governor Dawn Rochelle recognized the exemplary work of Secretary Cohen and the entire NC Department of Health and Human Services team during the past 10+ months as they have led North Carolina s response to COVID 19. The work and the work of her team represents the principles and ideals of Rotary International in a primary area of



focus, disease prevention and treatment $\hat{\phi}$, said Governor Rochelle.

The Paul Harris Fellow recognition represents Rotarians in all 100 counties, 12,200+ strong in 287 Rotary Clubs. Rotary International is an apolitical, nonreligious organization most known in this area of focus for their work to rid our planet of the Polio virus. Education, elevating awareness, and tenacity in the face of uncertainty is something Rotarians understand. , Governor Rochelle elaborated further.

Rotary International Director and Chair of the Executive Committee for Rotary International Stephanie Urchick presented the award, noting that many other notable figures that have been named Paul Harris Fellows,

including U.S. President Jimmy Carter, U.S. astronaut James Lovell, polio vaccine developer Jonas Salk and NIAID Director Anthony Fauci.

Joining Director Urchick and Governor Rochelle were Past Rotary International President and Current Trustee of the Rotary Foundation Barry Rassin, Rotary International Director Peter Kyle, Rotary International Regional Foundation Coordinator for Zone 33, Nancy Barbee, District 7720 Governor Spencer Stanley, District 7710 Governor David Hayden, District 7680 Governor Mike Walker, District 7690 Governor Tommy Rosser and District 7670 Governor David Waechter.





Christmas made possible for campus


