Due to the COVID-19 pandemic we were forced to hold our celebration virtually for the first time (and hopefully, the last). We had a tremendous amount of success in our giving in 2019-2020 as we contributed \$256,819 to the Rotary Foundation Annual Fund and over \$40,000 to our END POLIO campaign! Together, we have made a difference and



impacted people so lives in North Carolina and throughout the world. THANK YOU ALL!! Here is a recap of our Rotary International and District 7730 Recognition Awards:

100% Foundation Giving Clubs (all club Rotarians contributed to TRF and the club averaged \$100 or more per Rotarian in contributions)

Burgaw, Fair Bluff, Fayetteville, Morehead City, Shallotte,

Southport and Wilmington Central. The same seven clubs also received EREY Banners; Top 3 Per Capita Giving Clubs-Fayetteville

received EREY Banners; Top 3 Per Capita Giving Clubs-Fayetteville \$855.00 per capita, Shallotte \$763.62, and South Brunswick Islands \$601.39 per capita; Top 3 clubs in total giving contributions-South Brunswick Islands Club \$37,286, Wilmington Rotary \$14,532 and Jacksonville \$11,196; Top Giving Clubs to PolioPlus-Burgaw \$7700, Clinton \$5903, South Brunswick Islands \$4928, New River \$4053, Beaufort-Ole Town \$3059, Fayetteville \$3,000. ## Student's Daily Six-Mile Walk Inspires Kinston Rotary Hotspots

When COVID-19 caused schools to shift to remote learning in March 2020, Cameron Knepper, a 16-year-old sophomore at North Lenoir High School started to walk. He had no broadband internet connection at his home in rural Lenoir County, so he put his tablet in his book bag and walked three miles to sit on a bench outside the closed school to connect to the school so Wi-Fi. Then he walked three miles home. Six miles, every day, five days a week, wind, rain, cold, sun, whatever the weather.

## Wilmington Central Rotary Donates 150 Blue Bags to Prostate Cancer Patients

150 Blue bags will be delivered to NHRMC Cancer Center. Our goal was to donate 100 bags.

The Blue bags are filled with convenience and comfort items to give to prostate cancer patients to make their visits to the cancer center more comfortable. The Wilmington Central Rotary decided on the project becayse September is recognized as Prostate Health Month and Prostate Cancer Awareness Month. Blue Bag and Prostate Cancer.

In the USA, over 160,000 men are diagnosed with prostate cancer each year, and about 30,000 die from it. Early detection is the key to successful treatment. This awareness period, and the organizations and associations that support it, are responsible for saving an untold number of men so lives by encouraging them to have a discussion with their healthcare provider about prostate cancer and early detection.

This Blue Bag Initiative allowed our small Rotary to help a local nonprofit, BLUE BAG PROJECT INC.

#### **Financial Costs:**

- \$15 for supplies and the bag
- \$15 supports the cost of one bag
