Club Anniversaries from our world. Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 35 years. We have reduced polio cases by 99.9% since our first project to vaccinate children in the Philippines in 1979.

Rotary members have contributed more than \$2.5 billion and countless volunteer hours to protect nearly 3 billion children in 122 countries from this paralyzing disease. Rotary so advocacy efforts have played a role in decisions by governments to contribute more than \$10 billion in the effort. Over 430 million children in total have been vaccinated in 39 countries.

Wilmington Rotary Club-Wilmington Creekwood Green Garden Project Matching Amount: \$2,000
Partnering with the Ability Garden, part of the New Hanover County Arboretum, WRC has worked with
Creekwood youth for eight years in various school settings. One goal of this project is to continue to work with
the youth we encounter at school in their own neighborhood. In addition, the Wilmington Rotary Club have
supported gardening efforts of two Creekwood families over the past two years, as the residents gardens have
developed, their neighbors have taken notice and expressed interest in gardening. One resident we work with
has completed culinary school and is interested in providing cooking classes, using the produce from her garden.
With this project we want to support and expand these efforts. While the primary goal of the gardens will be to
produce food, WRC wants to use these gardens to create a sense of place and belonging for Creekwood. This is
a community that has seen much violence in recent years. Residents are distrustful of each other and of the
larger Wilmington community. The gardens will give them a positive place to interact with their neighbors and
create spaces they can be proud to share with those outside their neighborhood. Creekwood has watched as
resources have poured into other neighborhoods and have felt forgotten. This project will engage, educate, and
support the residents as they work for their own change in environment

Coastal Pender Rotary Club- Matching Amount: \$1,350

Partnering with The Girl Scouts of Pender County and Roots of Recovery-this program is to assist Rotarians and Roots of Recovery staff in providing community education and in- services to the criminal justice courts in Pender County and Onslow County, and the Department of Social Services in Pender and Onslow counties working alongside of local attorneys and probation departments.

Funding will also be used to create educational materials, create online training and workshops with the expectation that the Roots of Recovery program can be replicated by other programs.

Funding is required to cover the costs of material and supplies for Community Service Program members while completing work assignments on site. The goal is to lower recidivisms rates in this community.

Maysville Rotary Club- Matching Amount \$500

Youth DEI Movie Nights- Free family movie nights hosted by the Maysville Rotary Club will provide an opportunity to build and strengthen community relationships. Funds will be used to purchase screen and projector. The movies selected will highlight diversity, equity and inclusion. Maysville Rotary Club will also provide free books to low income children contributes to equity in their educational journeys.

Fayetteville Rotary Club- Matching Amount \$500

The Fayetteville Club will partner with the Autism Society and Rotaractors. Grant funds will used to purchase classroom supplies and equipment for the Autistic Community. Rotarians and Rotaractors will participate in outdoor activities with the community. The goal of the club so involvement is to help to drive awareness and educate to the community at large. Additionally, funds will be used to help provide tools and resources for families and caregivers living and supporting people with autism.

Southport Rotary Club is seeking funding for an inaugural DEI film festival contest, featuring three different student age groups, answering the question, ** What would you do to improve services here in the County ** to make it better for everyone?** The community would get to hear the youth ** sthoughts on DEI issues in their communities. The District DEI taskforce was not able to match their request, but supports their effort to engage, educate and drive awareness of DEI values to their community.

Native American Heritage Month

Native American Heritage Month



November is Native American Heritage Month. November is a time to celebrate rich and diverse cultures, traditions, and histories and to acknowledge the important contributions of Native people. It is also an opportune time to educate the public about Native history, to raise awareness about the unique challenges Native people have faced both historically and in the present.

In the late 1800s and early 1900s, Native American children were taken from their parents and sent to boarding schools. The impact of young Native children taken to boarding schools generations earlier is still influencing Native American communities' todays. Secretary of Interior Deb Haaland, first Native American appointed to the position, established the Federal Indian Board School Initiative after the June 2021 discovery of 215 graves of Native children at a boarding school. This initiative's purpose is to investigate and shed light on this dark era of cultural genocide at boarding schools.

Native American parents view boarding schools as a destruction of Native culture, objecting to the specific aspects of the education system, manner of discipline and the children's health. Resentment of the boarding schools was most severe because it broke the sacred and fundamental ties of the parent-child bond. It wasn't until 1978 with the passing of the Indian Child Welfare Act that Native American parents gained the legal right to deny their child's placement in off reservation schools.

On Thursday, Sept. 30, a day when Indigenous peoples across North America commemorated multiple generations of stolen children, the Truth and Healing Commission on Indian Boarding School Policies in the United States Act was introduced by Sen. Elizabeth Warren in the Senate, with a House version of the bill introduced by the Co-Chairs of the Congressional Native American Caucus, Rep. Sharice Davids and Rep. Tom Cole. This bill would establish a formal commission to investigate, document, and acknowledge past injustices of the federal government's Indian Boarding School policies. This includes attempts to terminate Native cultures, religions, and languages; assimilation practices; and human rights violations. The commission would also develop recommendations for Congress to aid in healing of the historical and intergenerational trauma passed down in Native families and communities. It would also provide a forum for victims to speak about personal experiences tied to these human rights violations.

The DEI team encourages you to read up on Native American boarding school history and share any learning points.



Will You Gift Justin Lammerts Another Chance at Life?

In 1997, our Son, Justin, got a second chance at life after being born with a heart defect. Unfortunately, the medicines that protected his transplanted heart have damaged his kidneys and he now needs a kidney transplant.

Before he fell ill again, Justin was able to lead a semi-normal life. Justin worked full-time for the State of New York, earning two promotions. Justin has an intense passion for history and traveled to London, France, and even a solo trip to Italy to see the worlds most beautiful art and architecture. He has a rich imagination and enjoys Lord of the Rings, Star Wars, and attended Comic-Con in NYC several years in a row before falling ill. We laugh everyday we are around Justin, as he has a witty and off-beat sense of humor. I smile thinking about hearing him cackle from the other room while he is watching his favorite TV show, Seinfeld.



As Justin's condition has worsened, he has lost the ability to do the things he loves. He even had to miss both his brother's and best friend's wedding in the last two years. Riding his bike and walking on the beach have become challenging these days. If Justin doesn't get a transplant, he will have to go on dialysis soon, which will mean he will be chained to a machine which filters his blood for him. It breaks my heart to think about all the things he will not be able to do. A transplant would give him the ability to live a longer, more healthy life where he can do the things that he loves.

For many reasons, Justin's close family members are not able to be his donor. Finding a kidney for a transplant is not easy. There are 110,000+ people on the waiting list for a deceased donor kidney. Most people must wait for years and many die while waiting. Will you give Justin the gift of a better life?

- 1. Facts about being a Living Donor: You only need one kidney to live a long healthy life.
- 2. Donor surgery is usually done through a tiny incision (laparoscopically).
- 3. Is covered by insurance/Medicare.
- 4. You will have your own team of doctors who will evaluate if its right for YOU.
- 5. Screening can be done anonymously, so you will not feel pressure.
- 6. If you are not a match, you can still "donate" to Justin through a program called a donor swap.
