"What's that you're doing, Bob?

"...and now you know the rest of the story"

It might come as a surprise to my Rotary friends and colleagues that I have a decided interest in military history. My great uncle Bob McGregor, a WWI veteran and master storyteller, stoked my passion for storytelling.

While in grade school I was an avid reader of comic books and an ad one day caught my eye. It promised that for 99 cents and postage I could receive plastic cavalrymen and Indians allowing me to reenact Custer's Last Stand. But of more lasting import than the little plastic figures was a small print booklet on the 1876 battle.

Already familiar with the Walt Disney versions of American history, I, of course, had my own coonskin cap. Captain Miles Keogh's famous horse Comanche, believed to be battle's sole survivor, was the subject of the 1958 movie *Tonka*. In 1960 vocalist Johnny Horton sang a catchy and mournful ballad about the brave horse and its many wounds. Imagine my surprise when the booklet accompanying my toy combatants stated that there was also an unsung surviving Crow Indian scout.

Almost thirty years later I was working on a master's degree project focusing on the changing story the National Park Service has told while administering Custer Battlefield National Monument. An extensive 1983 fire at the

monument led to modern archaeological investigation and analysis of battlefield artifacts. And the long accepted mystery of Custerâ \in TMs demise evaporated with the introduction of scientific evidence.

The evidence took the form of expended cartridge and bullet analyses which revealed soldier and Indian firing positions and, hence, the course of the battle. Professional historians had long speculated on how Custer was undone by his Sioux and Cheyenne opponents. Native testimony, unless supporting some historian's pet theory on the unfolding battle, had long been discounted. Traditional historical practice dictated that only white surviving soldiers could be trusted to give accurate and unbiased reports of the engagement. When summarized, however, the numerous individual accounts from Native participants closely supported the physical evidence and embarrassed the traditionalists.

Many mythic stories that had arisen around the battle wound up discredited by the new evidence. Disney $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{T}^m$ s movie Tonka sadly turned out to be pure romanticized fiction and consequently terrible history. Comanche even turned out not to be the only horse that survived $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$. And what of my Crow scout survivor described in that booklet so many years ago? Curly was his name. He died young, of alcoholism, his report of the battle disbelieved because of his youth, his race, and the shocking import of his news.

Paul Harvey was an ABC radio news commentator for more than 50 years and noted for his historical vignettes. He always signed off with "And now you know the rest of the story.†This anecdotal approach to history fits my personal definition of good storytelling. Your audience needs to be engaged and also learn something new. And now you know something more both about me and American history.

Community Service Committee

New Committee Meeting Location at Eugene Chamber

The Community Service Committee is the Club's vetting and management arm for all official, club-sponsored local service projects. Service projects are defined as projects within the community that 1) provide member opportunities for Service Above Self, 2) meet the 4-Way Test, 3) meet any additional criteria assigned by the committee, and 4) involve projects that predominantly require sweat equity from club members (i.e., committee funds may be granted to a project as long as the funds do not constitute the bulk ok the club's support for the project. We do not select projects that require only funding). The committee receives annual funding from the club that has ranged from \$2,500 to \$10,000 per annum and is responsible for selecting our District Grant proposals.

The committee now meets the 4th Wednesday of each month from 4:00-5:00 pm at Lane Workforce Partnership, second floor of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce, 1401 Willamette Street, Eugene, OR 97401.

The committee roster is open to all club members in good standing.
