

TODAY'S PROGRAM



John McKinney, Board Member for Canine Companions for Independence (CCI), introduced its CEO, Paige Mazzoni, and also its Director of Philanthropy, Ginger Kelly.

Paige started the presentation by sharing that CCI, a non-profit organization, was founded in Santa Rosa in 1975 and it created the concept of service dogs for mobility issues. At that time, guide dogs existed for blindness, but the organization created the category of service dogs for paraplegics, mobility issues, neurological, hearing, auditory and veterans with PTSD.



CCI has 6 campuses across the US. The Headquarters is in Santa Rosa, on a campus donated by Jean Schulz. It has 300 employees and about 4,000 volunteers. CCI graduates about 400 dogs per year or over 8,000 teams have been placed since CCI's inception. Dogs that do not graduate can be certified as therapy dogs. Currently, there are around 300 therapy dogs. Puppy raisers and breeder caretakers volunteers are about 1,250. Currently, Donna & **Jaime Campoverde** are volunteers and are taking care of Zylah, a CCI breeder.





CCI dogs are partnered, at no cost, with adults and children with disabilities to assist with daily tasks and increase independence by reducing reliance on other people. A service dog can pull their partner in a manual wheelchair, alert to the sound of a doorbell, push buttons for elevators or automatic doors, and even assist with business transactions by transferring money, receipts, and packages. Facility dogs are expertly trained dogs that are partnered with a facilitator working in a health care, visitation or education setting. They do not have public access like service dogs, but they have access within a facility like hospitals and criminal justice system. Canine Companions facility dogs can perform over 40

commands designed to motivate and inspire clients with special needs. To support veterans with

PTSD, dogs can also be trained in tasks including anxiety and nightmare interruption, and supporting their handler in crowded public situations that might provoke anxiety for individuals with PTSD.



Ginger also shared that in addition to puppy raiser and volunteering opportunities, there are many other ways people can volunteer such as dog walking, dog bathing, providing lunch to training teams, helping on events, fundraising, and more.
