Frances Schierenbeck said our topic of historic commercial buildings of Healdsburg is timely, as May is historic preservation month. Frances gave many reasons why the preservation of our historic buildings is important; connecting us with our history, preservation of architectural styles no longer in fashion, and building materials that may be irreplaceable today among them. She had slides of some of the buildings that have won preservation awards from the museum. The styles



ranged from the Italianate and Greek Revival bank and commercial buildings from the early 1900s to Mediterranean Revival -the Chamber of Commerce building, a WPA project, to the Purity Market building, Streamline Moderne in style and one of the first supermarket chains putting many grocery, green grocer, butcher, bakery items under one roof.
