


At 12:30 pm President Sheila Fagliano rang the bell to open the meeting of Valentine's Day 2024.

## Program for the Day: Marc Roberts: Waking Up With Someone Else's Kidney







achieving PHF status.





There are 2 types of cheeses: Raw or pasteurized. Raw is unheated and pasteurized is heated to a certain temperature.

- Annatto is what turns cheese orange
- Hardest animal to milk is a goat!
- There is really no difference between Sharp, Mild or Regular cheddar. It is just a matter of how much salt they put into it. Sharp means salty.
- Most people that think they are lactose sensitive and donâ

  ™t want to eat cheese because
  of that need to know that most lactose is gone (or virtually most) after cheese is aged 90
  days and certainly by 18 months.
- Feel free to stop by his shop and he or his trained staff will answer any of your questions.





### Today's Program: Dr. Dyrell Foster, President of Las Positas College

He and his wife and family moved here in Livermore four years ago. Shared a few stories about the generosity of neighbors and the caring community here in Livermore. They moved up from Southern California. He started at Las Positas in February right before COVID

Over 55% of Tri-Valley residents are college educated. 80% of the high school students attend college. The population of Las Positas

is relatively young. Serve a diverse population. About

15,000 students are served in a year. In 2023 the college was ranked #1 community college in California. This year it is ranked #4 in the country! It is important that Las Positas creates an environment that supports student learning and employees. New on campus is a Horticulture Center and new administration building. Viticulture and Winery Technology Facility is also being developed.

There is a college foundation that supports 20 incoming high school seniors with a full ride scholarship. It is known as LPC President's Scholars program. On campus is a free market with free food and hygiene products for any student.



Over the last few years the college has really focused on academic and career pathways. The goal is to help students focus on a career and guide them to reaching that career. There is also a guaranteed transfer programs with UC Merced and CSUEB. Many certificate programs are also offered such as: Fire Service technology. In addition, Industry Credentials are also offered.

Mental Health Services are also available at the college. There is a child development center that supports students, employees and community members with child care. There are internship programs and opportunities. LPC also supports the Marilyn Avenue STEM program in the summer. Many partnerships with local community businesses have been developed.

#### Questions:

How do you coach students who may have been on a career path and then Al may have an impact? Response: We try to keep up with the current trends and include lots of professional development so faculty is kept up to speed with the changing technology. Al is a tool that is often used, but teaching how to use it in an ethical way is important.

How do you address the homeless students? Has there been a thought to build dormitories? Response: Highly engaged in seeking ways to bring housing to LPC. Last year a grant was put out from California and LPC did apply for that. However, the state unfortunately could not fund the grant.

What is being offered for public service for careers? Response: They have been working with the city for opportunities with internships.

What is your wish list? Response: Scholarships are always welcome and using the unrestricted funds for any of the many needs for LPC.
