Women's Awareness Month:

President Andy saluted Louisa May Alcott; (November 29, 1832 – March 6, 1888). She was an American novelist, short story writer, and poet best known for writing the novel *Little Women* (1868) and its sequels Little Men (1871) and Jo's Boys (1886). Raised in New England by her transcendentalist parents, Abigail May and Amos Bronson Alcott, she grew up among many wellknown intellectuals of the day, including Margaret Fuller, Ralph Waldo Emerson, Nathaniel Hawthorne, Henry David Thoreau, and Henry Wadsworth Longfellow.

Alcott's family suffered from financial difficulties, and while she worked to help support the family from an early age, she also sought an outlet in writing. She began to receive critical success for her writing in the 1860s. Early in her career, she sometimes used pen names such as **A**. **M. Barnard**, under which she wrote lurid short stories and sensation novels for adults that focused on passion and revenge.

Published in 1868, *Little Women* is set in the Alcott family home, Orchard House, in Concord, Massachusetts, and is loosely based on Alcott's childhood experiences with her three sisters, Abigail May Alcott Nieriker, Elizabeth Sewall Alcott, and Anna Alcott Pratt. The novel was well-received at the time and is still popular today among both children and adults. It has been adapted for stage plays, films, and television many times.

Alcott was an abolitionist and a feminist and remained unmarried throughout her life. She also

spent her life active in reform movements such as temperance and women's suffrage. She died from a stroke in Boston on March 6, 1888, just two days after her father's death.

President Andy then introduced our program. **Chris Elias** the Executive Director for the San Joaquin Area Flood Control Agency (SJAFCA), who has presented to us before, had an update on 4 projects regarding our flood safety in San Joaquin County. Their main responsibility is to maintain and rebuild our levees protecting against floods and reducing the cost and need for residents to require flood insurance. The City and County got together 28 years ago and created the agency in response to FEEMA's demands. It is a small agency and only has 7 employees. They contract out for the flood work

A very innovative endeavor to build a flood gate to prevent rising flood water into the canal and neighborhoods. This eliminates the neighborhoods requirement for flood insurance. The project has been completed and submitted to FEEMA. They are supposed to remove and reclassify the area in May of 2024. Here are construction maps and pictures of this incredible project.
