

Dear Club President,

Human Trafficking worldwide is the second largest criminal activity, second only to drugs. Whether forced labor or sex trafficking, it is in every corner of the United States and your community is not immune to this heinous crime. As Rotarians or members of our communities, we need to be at the forefront of combatting modern-day slavery.

The July issue of the Rotary Magazine, on page 12 is an article on how Rotarians tackle the big issues and focused on Rotarians who are working hard to combat human trafficking. On November 1st, 2021, an Anti-Trafficking Resolution 21R-28 was overwhelmingly approved by the RI Council on Resolutions, followed by full approval of the Rotary International Directors at their February 2022 board meeting. This resolution was a historic recognition of the problem of both sex and labor trafficking and stated: "Now, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of Rotary International to encourage all Rotarians to become more familiar with the growing problem of modern-day slavery, to be vigilant and report suspicious activity and to work towards solutions to end modern-day slavery in all its forms. <u>Be it further resolved to encourage Rotary Clubs around</u> <u>the world to engage in projects to protect all victims from hunger, neglect, abuse, and all forms of exploitation and modern slavery."</u>

Join us on October 1, 2022, either in person in San Diego or virtually through Zoom and leave with an action plan and a play book for your district or club that will allow everyone to protect their families and community.



For frequency choose "monthly" and for amount choose "other" and enter \$10 in the "enter other amount" box. If you wish to donate more, or quarterly or annually instead, you have those options as well. (To donate online, make sure you have registered on <u>myrotary.org</u> for a My Rotary account for you and your club to receive proper credit. Signing up is quick and easy).






Visalia Rotary Community Foundation Announces Scholarship Winners

The Visalia Rotary Community Foundation (VRCF) 2022-23 scholarship winners showcase the area's best and brightest, including students who are passionate about music, medicine and engineering. Student winners came from all four of Visalia's public major public high schools, demonstrating that talent abounds all over the city.

VRCF offers four kinds of scholarships, each funded by a major donor from a local Rotary club. These include The Jane and Bill Nash Scholarship (one year, for a Redwood High School graduate); The Dwelle Four-Year Scholarship (also for a Redwood grad, for four years of college); The Provident Salierno Family Foundation Music Scholarship (a one-time gift for students interested in a music career); and The Richard B. "Dick" Watson STEM Scholarship (two, one-time scholarships for students pursuing a major in science, technology, engineering or math).

Scholarship winners this year are:

McKenna Cook, a Redwood graduate, received both the Nash and Dwelle scholarships, for \$4,000 and \$20,000 respectively. Cook had a weighted GPA of 4.20, and lettered in soccer three years at Redwood. She plans to attend San Diego State University majoring in kinesiology with a career goal of becoming a physical therapist.

Sylvie Gonzalez (Golden West) and **Sean Nickell** (Redwood) both received STEM scholarships for \$2,000. Gonzalez will be the first person in her immediate family to attend college. Her ultimate goal is to study medicine and become a doctor to honor her late uncle, who was a pediatrician.
