Hello my Rotary Friends and Family,

Welcome to February and Peace & Conflict Prevention/Resolution Month.

As I sit here writing this, I leave with our Rotary group for Thailand tomorrow. It is a great privilege to be able to go on a Rotary International Service project, especially one that is from the efforts of our Clubs and District. One of the things that impresses me the most about our initiatives, is that when you do such a project, it touches so many of our 7 Areas of Focus, that it's hard to decide which one will be most impactful.

In this case, I do think that our trip will have an impact on Peace & Conflict Prevention/ Resolution. Meeting with people from another country, living with their families and becoming a part of their community is what prevents conflict, because we really get to know each other. The whole idea around so many Rotary initiatives, particularly Youth Exchange, is the notion that if we get to know each other, and appreciate each other's differences, we can create Peace. I am really looking forward to meeting our friends of the Baan Pakia Nork Village, who are part of the Karen Tribe, and promoting Peace in the world.

Unfortunately, there is not always Peace. Our Clubs and District have been very supportive of our fellow Rotarians and the communities in the Ukraine and Poland where many refuges have fled. We are just closing out our second Ukraine Disaster Relief Grant with RI, and are still collecting donations for the relief donation drive spearheaded by the Corral de Tierra Club. We are also introducing to you a program called Welcome.US, which allows members or Clubs to sponsor and assist families coming into your communities from the Ukraine. Please view the Welcome.US flyer in this newsletter.

We have just been notified by RI, that the Foundation Trustees have started another program for Disaster Relief Grants for the Ukraine and have also included Pakistan. From RI:

"The Trustees of The Rotary Foundation voted on 8 January to create separate funds to assist two areas — Pakistan and Ukraine — that are facing extreme need.

The Pakistan Flood Response Fund and the Ukraine Response Fund are being established to address the humanitarian crises caused by devastating flooding in Pakistan and the war in Ukraine.

Through these new funds, donors will soon be able to give directly to relief efforts led by Rotary members.

More information about the funds, including how you can make online donations, contribute District Designated Funds (DDF), and apply for grants, will be available in the coming weeks." 13-Jan-2023

ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE IN ACTION

The Youth Exchange Committee interviewed students and parents on December 10 in Visalia for the 2023-24 Youth Exchange Program. I am pleased to report that we selected all 12 of the student applicants and have tentatively placed one student in each of the following countries: Argentina, Belgium (French-speaking), Brazil, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Japan, Thailand, and Turkey. We are awaiting confirmation from two other countries with which we have exchanged in recent years.

We also tentatively paired the prospective outbound students with a sponsoring Rotary Club in our District and are in the process of contacting those Rotary Clubs with an introductory letter, participation commitment form, and Club compliance certification. Clubs agreeing to sponsor an outbound exchange student will also host an inbound exchange student for the 2023-24 school year.

The first orientation weekend for all outbound students will be on the Monterey Peninsula during the weekend of February 24-26. The orientation will include sections on completing the comprehensive long-form youth exchange application, obtaining a US passport, language training, travel arrangements and visas, and expectations for student behavior and becoming bicultural and biliterate.

Why Youth Exchange? Because it changes the lives of the participating students and the host families, Rotarians, and others with whom they come in contact. Students discover a larger world outside their own home, make friends, become members of new families, gain fluency in another language and culture, become more independent and self-confident, and foster peace – one student at a time.

Rotary and Welcome.US support newcomers

Since Russian forces invaded Ukraine, Rotary has been collaborating with our partners and other organizations to meet humanitarian needs in the region. Rotary clubs organized quickly and have been providing food, water, medical equipment, and other supplies.

What newcorners need most is safety — and Rotary members have been instrumental in finding shelter for people who have fied their homes. The United Nations estimates that at least 13 million people are displaced because of the war. Millions of people have left behind their homes and their belongings, and they need housing and support to rebuild their lives.

That's where Rotary members in the U.S. can get more involved. Rotary is collaborating with Welcome.US (welcome.us/about), an organization working to engage more Americans in welcoming newcomers, with a focus on sponsorship. Through Uniting for Ukraine (ukraine.welcome.us/), Rotary and Rotaract clubs and members in the U.S. can sponsor a person or a family that has fied the war and help them relocate to the United States.

BEING A SPONSOR

Sponsors are the support system that helps newcomers thrive. They serve as neighbors and guides to help people navigate a new city and a new culture. This difficult transition is easier for people with a friend by their side. Rotary and Rotaract members can be those friends.

By offering people a stable environment, Rotary members provide a pathway to safety and security for displaced Ukrainians — and change people's lives.

THE ROLE OF A SPONSOR

Sponsors make sure that the newcomers they're working with have the resources to start new lives in the United States. Sponsors also help people understand their new home.

A sponsor's role includes:

- Meeting people at the airport and taking them to where they're staying
- . Helping them find permanent housing and move in
- Assisting them with furniture and other essentials for their homes
- · Helping adults apply for jobs
- Advising adults about how to enroll children in school
- Helping people connect with health care providers
- Showing them where to shop for groceries, how to use public transit, and where to find resources like language classes

More than anything, sponsors are friendly, reliable, and understanding. Navigating a new environment can be frustrating or even frightening. A sponsor is a friend who can answer questions, provide guidance, and make people feel included in their new communities. And to help sponsors be successful, Welcome.US have developed resources and tools (ukraine.welcome.us/resources), including interactive guides, videos, fact sheets, tips, and checklists.

GETTING INVOLVED

U.S. residents can be sponsors if they pass the security and background screenings and can show that they have the financial resources necessary to provide the support that a person or family coming from Ukraine will need.

Several members of a Rotary or Rotaract club can apply to sponsor the same person or family, and other club members can get involved without being named as formal sponsors.

Through the Welcome Connect platform, the organization matches sponsors with a person or family that's seeking to relocate to the United States. To get started, register today on Welcome Connect (ukraine.welcome.us/connect). If you already know a Ukrainian person or family that you want to sponsor, complete the Uniting for Ukraine application (dhs.gowukraine).

If you or your fellow Rotary members apply directly with the U.S. government, please notify The Rotary Foundation so that we're aware of how our members are engaging with this initiative, trf.welcome@rotary.org.

THE DISASTER RELIEF FUND

Rotary districts in the U.S. that want to support newcomers and other people affected by the war in Ukraine can apply for US\$25,000 grants from the Disaster Response Fund until 31 December 2022. To apply, the district governor and Rotary Foundation chair download the Rotary Disaster Response Grant Application (my-cms.rotary.org/ en/document/rotary-disaster-response-grant-application) and send the completed document to grants@rotary.org.













Call For Director Nominations

What? - On 1-July-2023, several Director positions will open on the District 5230 Board of Directors. The BOD's purpose is to assist the District Governor and Governor line with management and operation of the District.

BOD Organization — The Board of Directors consists of 14 voting members and 2 non-voting members.

- 4 Officers— The District Governor, District Governor-Elect, District Governor-Nominee, and the immediate Past District Governor
- 10 Directors— Three from Fresno County Clubs, three from Tulare & Kings County Clubs, three from Monterey County Clubs and one representing Rotaract.
- o 2 Non-voting— District Secretary and District Treasurer.

Call for Nominations -- Clubs are encouraged to submit nominations using the Director Nomination Form (copy attached).

FAQs-

- o What are the requirements and duties? Duties include:
 - Representing the interest of Rotarians and Clubs in a geographic area.
 - Serving as a non-voting BOD representative on a District Committee.
- When are nominations due? Nomination forms are due no later than 1-February-2023.



Global Grant A Huge Success!

During DG Joy Anderson's year as Governor our District attempted to send \$10,000 to a Rotary Club in India for Pediatric COVID relief. Despite many attempts over a period of months, the money was unable to be transferred due to India's unusual banking laws. During DG Bruce Mackey's year as Governor, District Grants Chair Doug Brown stepped forward with an alternative plan. Through his long association with the Rotary Club of Madras, he knew that they were one of the few Rotary Clubs in India who were able to receive foreign donations. The Rotary Club of Madras (RCM) were aiding a pediatric hospital in their area that had actually been started by that club some years previously. RCM indicated that they would be excited to put our donation to the purchase of much needed pediatric hospital equipment for treating children with COVID. The \$10,000 was finally sent (augmented with another \$2,000 – Santa Cruz Sunrise and a private donor). However, by using the leveraging power of Global Grants, RCM turned the donation into a Global Grant, augmented it with their own funds, and with their District match and the match from The Rotary Foundation, the \$10,000 became \$84,400 in specialized medical equipment. As you will see in the photos and video link, RCM gave full appropriate credit to our District. Working together, we can move mountains!










