Dr. Kim has been a member of the Elks for 18 years and has been an officer for 13 of those. Soon after she joined, she was asked to be the Lodge Chaplain. She has served as a volunteer officer on and off throughout those years. A couple years ago, she decided that she would like to serve the Lodge as the Exalted Ruler. There was another officer, Julia, who was already planning on it. Kim was planning on following Julia and being the second female Exalted Ruler, but as fate would have it, she became the first female Exalted Ruler in 118 years.

She was an officer with the Cabrillo Beach Polar Bears for the last 21 years first as Vice President with Ray Falk and then as President for over 18 years. With her guidance, the Club has had up to 875 people join them in their New Year's Day swim. She still swims on most days ending in the letter Y.

In her professional life, she worked in television in post production. When she started doing triathlons, she decided to become a coach. From there, she became a Personal Trainer and started studying the body in order to affect change. She got her Masters degree in Kinesiology from Cal State Long Beach in 2007, became a Holistic Healthcare Practitioner and a Life Coach. She decided to use the pandemic to further her education and received her Doctorate in Natural Medicine in 2022. She has run her own business for over 20 years, being a coach for triathlon, swimming, running, cycling, as well as a life coach and personal training.

For Rotarians who are relatively new to the Club, EDF is a once-a-year event in which in *lieu* of meeting for our weekly luncheon program, we break up into much smaller groups for a dinner discussion at the homes of fellow Rotarians. This year the subject of our discussion will focus on our Club's future as a part of our Strategic Plan which is now underway by our Strategic Planning Committee.

Members of the Strategic Planning Committee will serve as facilitators at each host

home. We will discuss how we, as Club members, envision the Club's future over the next 3-5 years. The Strategic Planning Committee wants and needs member input, and EDF will be the first opportunity for feedback from the membership-at-large about this important topic.

The Strategic Planning Committee would like the Club members to share what they believe are the strengths and challenges within LB Rotary and the opportunities available and competition in the community which need to be taken into consideration in developing the Club's Strategic Plan for the next five years.

EDF gives all attendees an opportunity to get to know their fellow Club members on a more intimate basis; instead of 100-125 Rotarians at lunch, there will be 8-10 people around a dinner table at a Rotarian's home. Fellowship, dinner, discussion of the Strategic Plan, and then more fellowship is the usual sequence of events at EDF.

The hosts may choose to prepare a meal or elect to have dinner brought in - purely a matter of preference. The Club will reimburse each host \$35 per guest. In the spirit of appreciation, guests will typically bring a bottle of wine, flowers, or perhaps contribute to the meal such as preparing dessert. If a contribution to the meal is contemplated, coordination with the host is advisable.

EDF has been a signature Rotary event for many years, and an evening Rotarians always look forward to.

Madrid will work her magic to assign guests to the closest host home as possible.

Please sign up to attend ASAP; the window closes on Wednesday, January 31. And if you are willing to serve as a host, of which we typically need 6-8 depending on the number of attendees, please notify either Madrid or myself.

Members of Rotary, it is my pleasure to introduce Mike Wilson.




