# Congratulations... Schneider Family Scholarship Recipient

#### ROTARY SCHOLARSHIP FOUNDATION AWARDS SCHNEIDER FAMILY SCHOLARSHIP\*

I have the privilege to announce the newest named scholarship – **Schneider Family Scholarship**. As you know, the Scholarship Foundation goes through the process of annually reading applications and selecting the recipients for the various scholarships. Mark Schneider and his wife Nancy have recently established this scholarship for high school students planning to attend Cal State Long Beach. More specifically, it is a scholarship for students who have a learning difference. Since this was the first time it was being awarded, the Committee spent quite a bit of time determining how to evaluate the applicants. One of the things the Committee members determined was that the Scholarship was an acknowledgement that one size does not fit all. With the right support and opportunities, it can create equity in the classroom; it levels the playing field for students with learning differences; and helps them thrive in the academic environment. When you get the chance to meet our young candidate today, you will see ALL of that.

**Ivon Olea** is here today with her parents, Francisco and Veronica, who are sitting here in the front so proud and beaming and rightfully so. Ivon graduated in June from Educational Partnership High School (EPHS). It is a Long Beach Unified High School that has as its mission to provide a flexible and rigorous standard based, independent study curriculum. It encourages students to thrive at their own pace and receive personalized teacher support to meet their own individual needs.

Ivon's educational path was an interesting one. She knew that she was having challenges beginning in preschool. She had speech issues. She had trouble reading. She couldn't pronounce words. In fourth grade, her teacher Mr. Brooks helped her with reading and got her diagnosed with Dyslexia. As she describes it, she did not want help. But she finally accepted the help in middle school and that is when things really started turning around for her. She got a therapist, and it really made a difference. Ivon became a new person. She gained confidence, poise, and even charisma. This is what the Committee witnessed when we met her in May. And even though we met with several other amazing candidates, she really rose to the top.

Ivon attended Jefferson Middle School in accelerated classes, no less. She then went on to attend Wilson High School, taking AP classes there. In tenth grade (during the pandemic), she transferred to EPHS to continue in an independent academic program. The Committee was blown away by her 3.89 unweighted G.P.A. and 4.0 weighted G.P.A., which she worked very hard for. She's accomplished all of this with a lot of help from her family. It was not always easy. But she has a role model, her parents, who work very hard and started with nothing. Ivon has used that as a model and continues to look at that sort of perseverance and tenacity. She is a self-proclaimed "stubborn person." She knows that she is on a different path. She knows that she is smart and will succeed.

I am going to deviate from the script for a moment because there is a book by an author that I love, Malcolm Gladwell, which many of you probably know of him. "David and Goliath: Underdogs, Misfits, and the Art of Battling Giants" talks about misfits and underdogs, like Steven Spielberg, Richard Branson, and Steve Jobs, who each had a learning disability. Those disabilities taught them they had something to overcome, and they each compensated in different ways. Steven Spielberg is Dyslexic and he translated that into visual storytelling. Richard Branson is also Dyslexic and he is terribly charismatic, got to know everyone and became incredibly successful.

Ivon's dream is to go to Cal State Long Beach and become an elementary school teacher because she has seen what a difference learning can make in creating opportunities, understanding that "different" doesn't mean anything other than different. And in some ways, you're the same as others.

I will leave you, Ivon, with one other way that we are the same. When I looked at your transcript this morning, preparing for this conversation I realized that you and I have something in common. You grew up, literally, 500 feet from the house, where I grew up. So, where you come from and what you are born with does not dictate where you end. With that, will you all join me in congratulating Ivon on her amazing achievements.

### Rotary International Foundation - Rotary Direct

The Rotary Foundation Mission Statement: The Rotary Foundation helps Rotary members to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace by improving health, providing quality education, improving the environment, and alleviating poverty

When I joined Rotary in 2003, I knew and embraced the idea of making donations. HOWEVER, I did not realize that there were three different foundations to make a donation: The Long Beach Rotary Charitable Foundation, the Long Beach Rotary Scholarship Foundation, and The Rotary Foundation (commonly known as TRF or the Rotary International Foundation). The three are all good and all worthy of support!

After serving as our Club's President in 2012-2013, I became the Club's "Foundation Chair", a position held in every Rotary Club to help educate and promote The Rotary Foundation (TRF). It was then I climbed the learning curve and became more

acquainted with the complexities of TRF, e.g. the "areas of focus", PolioPlus, and the myriad levels of recognitions. Starting with the above-stated mission statement, there's lots to learn!

Don Cochran is now our Club's TRF Chair. Given my past experience, Don has graciously allowed me to help him with a specific project for November (Foundation month): promoting Rotary Direct, i.e. automating monthly contributions from our credit/debit cards. It's simple, easy, and consistently saves and changes lives throughout the world.

How so? Let's focus on Rotary's initiative to eradicate Polio from this planet. This gargantuan project started in 1985 when Polio was raging throughout the world with over 350,000 cases each year in 125 countries. Thanks to Rotary's leadership, persistence and contributions from Rotarians along with other numerous organizations, Polio cases have been reduced by **99.9%** with only a few cases being reported in two countries: Afghanistan and Pakistan. As Rotarians say, "We are that close!". Given the cost of 60 cents per vaccination and the Gates Foundation's 3 to 1 match, the minimum Rotary Direct amount of \$10/month effectively protects 50 children/month from Polio's life crippling virus. This vaccination is simple, easy, and consistently saves and changes lives throughout the world.

If anyone signs up at the \$10/month level for PolioPlus, they will be recognized as a PolioPlus Society Member. If anyone signs up at the \$85/month level, they will be recognized as a PolioPlus Society Member AND a Paul Harris Society Member. Whatever the monthly amount, any Rotary Direct signup will be participating in human history to achieve what was once thought the unachievable.

Don's goal is to have 25 Rotary Direct signups by the end of this month, making our Club **2**<sup>nd</sup> in Rotary Direct signups out of the 35,000 Rotary Clubs in the world. Thanks to the following nine Rotarians, we only need 16 more! Will you consider doing this? If so, please let Madrid, Don or me know.



## **RCLB Navajo Project**

#### WHAT IS THE RCLB NAVAJO PROJECT?

The RCLB Navajo Project aims to create Rotarian to Navajo relationships and to support the Navajo efforts to improve the lives of their people.

This year, we have two major projects to help in this effort.

The first is the Community Fund and Awareness Raiser to support efforts to make clean, potable water available to all Navajo, scheduled for April 14, 2024. This Project aligns with Rotary International's major goal for water development: "Clean water, sanitation, and hygiene are basic necessities for a healthy environment and a productive life."

30% of families in the Navajo Nation live without running water. They drive for miles to haul barrels of water to meet basic needs. RCLB will raise money to financially support Dig Deep and their efforts to provide basic water systems to Navajo families.



■We will also

again visit the Navajo in the Spring of 2024. Responding to specific requests from the Navajo and St. Anne Mission in Klagetoh, Arizona, this year we will replace the roof of a Hogan



& attached kitchen, which will promote community and re-kindle spirit in this important building. Rotarians are in a unique position to find the supplies and talent to make repairs requested by the Navajo.
