100th ANNIVERSARY **WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE MOVEMENT** Dr. Virginia "Ginny" L. Baxter Ginny's Getaways

It was 100 years ago on August 20, 1920, that Tennessee became the last of thirty-six state approvals needed for the Nineteenth Amendment to be ratified, guaranteeing suffrage across the United States. California had already become the sixth state where women gained voting equality nine years earlier in 1911, but it was this milestone date, 100 years ago, that the Nineteenth Amendment became binding.

Fellow Rotarian Dr. Virginia "Ginny†Baxter will speak on the history and importance of this anniversary.

Ginny started her career at Long Beach City College (LBCC) in 1970 by teaching U.S. History after graduating from Occidental with a BA and MA in History. She was appointed as LBCC's Assistant Dean of Student Affairs, Women's Advisor in 1975. In 1983, she was asked to take over the reins of the LBCC Foundation. At that time there were assets of \$500,000, with \$50,000 being raised annually. She increased the assets to over \$16 million, and for the past 25 years, helped raise more than \$35 million for the Foundation.

In 1988 she earned a Doctorate in Educational Management at the University of LaVerne. She retired from the Long Beach Community College District in 2011 to work solely for the Long Beach City College Foundation.

In April, 2014 she was elected to the LBCCD District 5 Trustees position succeeding longtime Trustee, Dr. Tom Clark. This area encompasses the eastside of Long Beach and south side of Lakewood.

## Did You Know ...



Rotary International made the groundbreaking announcement recently that Jennifer E. Jones will become its first woman president in its 115-year history. This announcement caused us to reflect on the story of women in our own Rotary Club of Long Beach.

Of the 103 women who are currently Active members of the RCLB, 30 have been Rotarians over 10 years â€" and some for 33 years! Among those, six have been Presidents of the RCLB and one was President of another club and served as an Assistant District Governor before joining the RCLB.

#### The Women of Rotary

The book, A Century of Service: The Story of Rotary International, details the various ways women were involved in the organization's history since the early 1900s -- except as members. Click on this link, Women in Rotary, for an overview of events leading to court rulings outlawing gender discrimination in what had been traditionally all-male private clubs.

Following a historical decision by the United States Supreme Court on May 4, 1987, the RCLB moved quickly to implement a compliance plan and to integrate women into their membership ranks. The next day, on May 5<sup>th</sup>, RCLB leadership made phone calls inviting women to join as members. In September, included in the RotaryGram list of proposed members were the names of 4 women.

#### Trailblazers

Between October 1987 and December 1988 six women became RCLB members: Jean Bixby Smith, Jane Netherton, Jayne Lastusky, Cam Doherty Killingsworth, Stephanie James, and Beverly O'Neill. Each considered it an honor to be asked to join the Club, known for its tradition of service to Long Beach. They all still are Active members of the RCLB.

Donna Reckseen joined in 1990 and served as an Active member for 26 years. Today, as an Honorary member, she continues to give her time promoting and recognizing new Paul Harris Fellows. Honorary member Karen Wyrick served as the RCLB Executive Director for 33 years (1979-2012).

### Transitions

The RCLB President #70 Bud Nance and incoming President #71 Craig Dougherty led the RCLB through the initial transition time, skillfully handling what is now recognized as the science and psychology of "change managementâ€.

The RCLB had been an all-male domain for 70 years, and not everyone was comfortable allowing women at first. John Wavell, a RCLB member for 58 years who recently passed away, was famously quoted in a newspaper article saying he was considering leaving Rotary if women became members. In a 2017 interview with the Long Beach Business Journal, Jean Bixby Smith said,  $\hat{a}\in\hat{a}\in \mathbb{N}$  I will say that despite the feelings  $\hat{a}\in \mathbb{N}$  and I was warned that I might not get a very warm reception from some  $\hat{a}\in \mathbb{N}$  I absolutely never felt it. $\hat{a}\in \mathbb{N}$ 

As with all social change, acceptance was gradual, and eventually the women members were accepted by everyone. John Wavell did not resign, and on the occasion of the RCLB's Centennial, he addressed the issue. Before raising a glass of champagne in a toast to the Club's 100<sup>th</sup> year he said, "I was totally wrong in my assumption that women would be bad for Rotary -- they turned out to be wonderful! And without the women in our Club, we probably wouldn't even have our Club anymore.†*Hear John Wavell's message here*

Today, the RCLB is not the Club of 1917 when it was founded or 1987 when women first joined - nor will the future Club be the same as it is today.
