
Greetings from your Governor!

The difference between Rotarians and the rest of the world is that we have guiding principles for ethical behavior and SELF evaluation that we use every day: The Four-Way Test of the Things we Think, Say and Do, and the Rotary Code of Conduct. The RI website states,

"These principles have been developed over the years to provide Rotarians with a strong, common purpose and direction. They serve as a foundation for our relationships with each other and the action we take in the world." These principles are NOT about other people, they are about how we live OUR OWN lives.

While we are all familiar with the Four-Way Test, not everyone is aware of the Rotary Code of Conduct, and especially #4: Avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians...

Club Presidents and District Leaders Chat on Zoom It may seem surprising, but many Rotarians are afraid to propose a Global Grant to their Rotary Club.

One seasoned Rotarian summed it up this way. "Global Grants can be a bit intimidating, even for those of us that have been doing this for a long time. If I have a choice, I'd always rather support someone else's than try to do my own!" Some say it probably requires a high tolerance for bureaucracy.

So, what's this beast that makes many shy away?

- First, they are large grants in the range of \$30,000 to \$400,000 in cost.
- Second, they should be completed in one year.
- Third, they find a joint project between a Host Club and International Club.
- Finally, they must be approved by The Rotary Foundation (TRF).



Global Grants fund large international activities with sustainable, measurable outcomes in Rotary's 7 areas of focus: peacebuilding and conflict prevention; disease prevention and treatment; water, sanitation, and hygiene; maternal and child health; basic education and literacy; community economic development; and the environment. Global grants can fund humanitarian service activities, scholarships for graduate-level academic studies, and vocational training teams (groups of professionals who travel abroad either to teach local professionals about a particular field or to learn more about their own).

In summary, Global Grants are big impact projects. They are what Rotary is known for in the world and what Rotarians continue to do in the world.

Next month, we will start demystifying the Global Grant process.


invited the attendees to become charter members of the PolioPlus Society, as well. The evening was complete with beautiful music from Him and Her of Greencastle and dancing the night away.

Election Season: Rotary Policy on Politics



As we enter the election season, it is important to remember that Rotary began as an inclusive group for its day and time. Today, it continues to strive to be inclusive of people in each community, and around the world. Rotary is also an organization that has used the 4-Way test for decades. Fairness and truthfulness are hallmarks of Rotary and the 4-Way Test.

At the end of this article are two portions of the RI Code Policies regarding politics. Each club approaches the handling of requests by political candidates differently. Whatever your club does, stay fair and equal.

Let's keep Rotary's reputation of being "apolitical"— "politically neutral; without political attitudes, content, or bias."

Let's be active in the political process, but equally important let's stay



friends inside our Rotary clubs and meetings.

From the Rotary International Code of Policies:

2.090. Clubs and Politics RI and its member clubs must refrain from issuing partisan political statements. Rotarians likewise are prohibited from adopting statements with a view to exerting any corporate pressure on governments or political authorities. (October 2013 Mtg., Bd.
