This Happened Last Monday...

Rhonda Starghill introduced the day's guests and visitors. Member Terry Offenberger's guest was Elaine Bonner from Emerge in Xenia; Jeff Schiavone's guest was Steve Sherbet, past counsel boar chair for Boy Scouts of America; and Jessica Barry's guest was Shayna Thomas from College of Modern Design. We welcomed our return guest Tom Carlisle!

Secretary Sarah Hippensteel Hall announced that there were no birthdays in attendance today. On February 15, Rotary Social we will have Dinner and A Movie Nightâ€"the movie "Sweet East†will be shown at the Neon with dinner on your own at the Oregon Express. Tickets are limited and are \$15.00. Rotary Rewards go to the members that brought guests to the meeting.

Sarah then called for Day 10's:

Kelly Lehman Day 10 for October 19, 2024, Rotary Leadership Institute and encouraged Rotarians to attend

Susan Hayes Day 10 in honor of Sue Taylor who, 10 years ago, gave her 2 Maine Coon cats;

Fran Rickenbach Day 10 in honor of Susan Hayes's beautifully handmade shawl that is the same color as her Maine Coons!;

President Kim Bramlage then came to the podium and acknowledged and thanked those Rotarians that have participated and completed the Rotary Leadership course, including Linda Groover, Steve Naas, Sue Taylor, Joanna McCord, and Frank Scott. The President also announced that Latisha Taylor earned her way to being a full-fledged member of Rotary by having her Red Ribbon removed. Congrats Latisha!

She welcomed Bill Nance back to present the Rotary Member Spotlight. Today's honoree was Frank Kivuyo. Frank is originally from Tanzania and was thankful for the beautiful way he was raised there. He held many jobs in his native country, including raising cows and being a Safari guide. He attended Drexel University in 2010 where he studied chemical engineering, worked in Washington, Delaware, California, and New Mexico. Of the places he has lived/worked in the United States, he has never felt as home as he does in Dayton. He appreciates the sense of community and closeness. He is married and has 2 small children. His family, his work and bowling with the Rotary Club keep him busy.

President Kim then brought up Scott Kayser who introduced us to the day's speaker, Tommie Jo Brode, President of Venice Solutions Group LLC, where she is a risk management coach and communicator. The topic of the day was "Generational Differences in the Workplaceâ€. She discussed the various age ranges for the different generations and what qualities each generation looks for in their work environment. Knowing what is important to your work force is invaluable to employers when working through conflicts among and between employees. For example, baby boomers (born years 1946 and 1964) most likely will have different work priorities than Millennials (born 1980-2001). They differ in their comfort with technology and its uses, what the "normal†workday looks like, what they expect from management, and how they define a "good place to workâ€.

Ms. Brode then discussed the various methods of communication between younger and more seasoned employees in the workplace. Harmony among a diverse workplace can be challenging, and somewhat dependent on how people communicate with each other, The methods include email, instant messaging/text; memo, mission statement, phone call, post-it notes, inperson conversations and virtual meetings. However, the modes of communication that present the most challenges to workplace harmony have nothing to do with written communication. Rather, body language, glances, appearances, tone and facial expressions oftentimes cause disharmony in the workplace.

Tips for promoting harmony include 1) recognizing different perspectives and having honest discussions about them at the time of hire, 2) explaining to applicants and employees the workplace culture as best as you can, 3) clearly outlining expectations with new hires and employees, and 4) consider communication training to make your written policies match the company's practices. The group then engaged in a Practice Scenario regarding communication between an older and a younger employee. Overall, those participating suggested coaching sessions for both employees. Ms. Brode then discussed the challenges of remote working, working with family members that are in the same business and that the costliest conflicts happen when 2 members of the same gender are squabbling!

Secretary Sarah then announced that Jacquelyn Powell of the Dayton/Montgomery County Convention & Visitors Bureau will be the speaker next week. She did the drawing for the Queen of Hearts pot (\$500) but there was no winner.

Ryan Kasinec led us in the 4 Way Test, and the meeting was then adjourned.


