They help those in need get proper identification and documentation such as birth certificates, including documents from other states so they can get an Ohio ID. These ID's are free but the documents needed are not always free. They serve about 70 persons a day and are open Wednesday

mornings. They have been providing this ministry for about 12 years.

Chair of the Day Susan Hayes introduced our speaker, fellow #Dayton #Rotarian Jacquelyn Powell. President and CEO of the Dayton Convention & Visitors Bureau. She shared unique insights into the positive impacts of conventions and tourism in our region.

Jacquie shared the Dayton Convention and Visitors Bureau, while housed at the Dayton Convention Center is not a part of the Convention Center. It is a separate non profit organization with 14 employees and they are funded with a portion of the lodging tax. They are focused on destination marketing for the Dayton region, an economic driver in the community. She shared many examples of audiences they approach, groups they host and how this helps hotel occupancy, restaurants, tax income, local jobs. Did you know that every day visitor to our region spends on average \$106 and every overnight visitor spends \$327. Dayton is a destination with many great venues, arts, attractions, and we have easy access and are known as a welcoming community.
