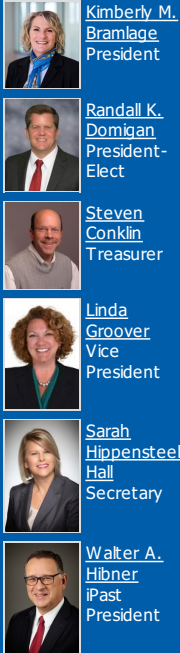

Fran then led us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

President Kim came back up for the Queen of Hearts drawing. John Neff won the opportunity to draw, and his wife Martha drew the Ace of Hearts.

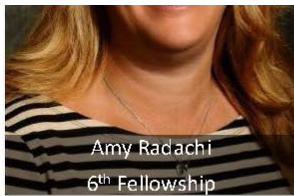
President Kim reminded us we are back here next week, Monday, March 11, for Ed Tomme from SciOps Consulting to discuss aviation in Dayton.

Jack Omer led us in the Four Way Test, and the meeting was adjourned.

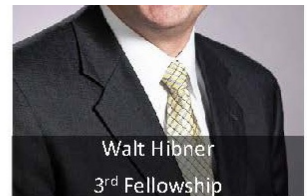

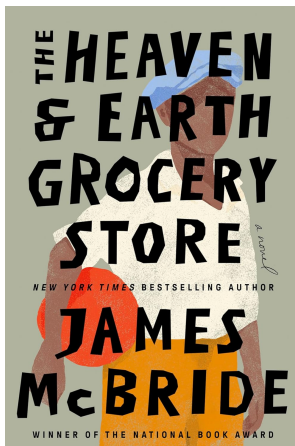
Book Club Set Their Books for 2024
