Chair of the Day: Kim Bramlage

This Happened Last Monday...

Kim Bramlage called the meeting to order. Bill Nance then presented Words to Live By, lifting up the gifts we have been given that can help us make a difference to others. Bill then led us in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Bill Nance then segued into News of The Day. Bill mentioned that Aldi is embarking on a huge expansion. Also, Honda is introducing an electric SUV with a \$39K starting price. He also told us about Rotary International's Sylvia Whitlock Leadership Award winner for 2024, Manjoo Phadke, of the Rotary Club of Pune Deccan Gymkhana, Maharashtra, India. Bill added to the news his celebration with his wife of their 49th wedding anniversary (beginning their 50th year of marriage) with a Day 50.

Rachel Jessup introduced today's guests and visitors:

Secretary announcements by Sarah Hippensteel-Hall included celebration of Terry Offenberger's birthday. There is a wine tasting this Thursday, March 14, and Axe Throwing on April 5. Also a reminder to sign up for the District Bed Build on April 13. There are two shifts: 9:30am to 12:00 noon, and 12:30 to 3:00pm. There is also a need for Twin-sized Beds-in-a-Bag (which includes sheet set and comforter) and pillows.

Secretary Sarah also recognized Shannon Bozeman and Terry Offenberger for Rotary Rewards. She also announced Rotary on the Road, which will be Monday, April 1 (no April Fool!). Locations are Five Rivers Health Center, The Human Race Theatre Company, Kettering Health Network (main campus) and We Care Arts. The fun water fact of the day: We have experienced an event recently that caused the Miami Valley Conservancy District to store 1.7 billion gallons of excess water. The good news is that there is a capacity to do this to avoid high water and flooding.

Sarah called up President Kim, who announced a volunteer opportunity on April 5 with Miami Valley Meals and then asked Lisa Grigsby to present a foundation check for \$3,000 to The Castle, an organization which serves adults with mental illness challenges. Frank Scott recognized two Paul Harris Fellows: Brian Martin and Shaun Yu.

Kim then called Kelly Lehman, Chair of the Day, to introduce today's speaker.

Kelly introduced Ed Tomme, currently with SciOps and formerly with Beta Technologies, to present an update on electric aircraft. Beta Technologies, led by Kyle Clark, is developing electric aircraft first for military and commercial use, with vertical or horizontal take-off capabilities. FAA approval for the engine is expected by the end of next year. These planesâ€[™] wings are modeled after the Arctic Tern (bird) wing and have only 11 moving parts, 5 of which are motors. Benefits include reduction of fuel costs, less need for airports, and noise reduction.


President Kim came back up for the Queen of Hearts drawing. Chuck Vella won the opportunity to draw, and he drew the Joker.

You may bring your bedding to any Rotary meeting between now and April 13th




Book Club Set Their Books for 2024




