## TOGETHER WE CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE

The Rotary Club of Dayton's 2024 - Red Ribbon Committee project goal is to provide multiple sensory elements for The Village Network youth, including "world drumming" sets; marvelous marble panels that provide visual, tactile, and aural sensory input; and Relaxation Popcorn Tubes which are a wonderful addition to the sensory environment.



The Relaxation Popcorn Tubes can be used as a valuable tool for both assessment and monitoring. The Rosetta Star Projectors will be used to show vast starry night skies indoors accompanied by relaxing and soothing white noise to help relax and calm youth with heightened anxiety.



The repetitive rhythms of focused, purposeful drumming, help to break the hold of the old life rhythms and patterns and reinforce the new rhythms, patterns and lessons of adulthood that are essential to the functioning of the society. "At-risk" youth are those who are literally at risk of making choices that lead to behavior patterns (rhythms) that are destructive to themselves, to their relationships with others and to their communities.

Drumming in a focused, supportive group is a powerful catalyst for breaking out of destructive patterns and replacing them with positive patterns in listening, communicating clearly, cooperating with others, being of service to a community, releasing tension, positive ways of channeling physical power and developing a "can-do" attitude along with a sense of celebrating life.

Announcements were made reminding the membership of the upcoming April 24th Fireside chat. Other updates:

- Tracey Tomme provided an update of the Rotary Youth Leadership Academy (RYLA). A successful Camp Kern trip for Dayton youth was completed, thanks to Rotarians Ann Riegle Crichton, Paul grunter, Shannon Bozeman, 2 teachers, bus drivers and RTA who transported the kids to Camp Kern for the annual outdoor outing.
- John Lohbeck announced that the club is transitioning from Bowling Outings to 5 Golf Outings this year. If anyone is interested our club will participate in 5 local golf scrambles, anticipated to be at Oakwood club, Centerville, Walnut Grove, Dayton Country Club, Miami Valley, or others to be determined. Let Jack know you are interested and he will add you to an e-mail chain for notification 2 weeks before T-Times. Dayton Rotary Club will have 3-foursomes to fill for each scramble and it will be a first come first serve opportunity. The cost is to be determined and the first 12 people will get a spot.

Three Rotary Awards were given a commemorative Dayton Rotary Club book signed by Dave Williamson.

- Tracy Tomme for her role in RYLA, stepping up and helping out with this important program. Rotary volunteers provide critical roles, including getting kids on and off buses. This year a couple kids needed special assistance and rotary volunteers helped get those kinds home earlier than planned and safely. Tracey and Sarah mentioned the Club is seeking volunteers for next year to help with the continuation of RYLA. Ask Sarah or Tracey if you are interested.
- 2. Linda Groover for filling in for Sarah while she was on vacation.
- 3. Shannon Bozeman for visiting two different Rotary on the road locations.

Secretary Sarah reported her weekly water fact, focusing on MCD recording its 7th high water event of the year, recorded April 11-15. Peak water storage was 5.4 billion gallons. This event ranks 126th of the largest Miami Conservancy District storage events. Englewood Dam is still storing water as of Monday, April 15. An increase of 228% of storage events where dams and levees are holding back more water has been documented by the Miami Conservancy District over the last several decades.

Following announcements, Sarah opened the floor up for limited Day-10 donations and since time was limited, please get your donations to Laura or bring them for Red Ribbon Takeover:

Linda Groover - \$10 for the student youth exchange program and announced the need for area families to host exchange students. The students are 15- to 19 year olds and attend a local school. Host families host for 3-4 months and the student stays with 3 families throughout the school year. We need to get a commitment from the first family now.

Ann Crichton- \$166 which is the sum of a math problem that includes her age (for her birthday), a digit from today's date and a number from a scifi question that only the geeks in the room would understand. For the Red Ribbon Project.

Amy Radachi - \$100 to her Paul Harris in recognition of her son who was in the Navy and was deployed for four months on foreign soil and surprised the family with a visit last week, safe and sound.

Annie Foos - \$50 to recognize Dots Market's Grocery Store Games- Cheeseboard/ Charcuterie Challenge. Happening April through July, you can sign up for classes to do a fun grocery store game to collect items from the shelves and assemble them onto a cheese board and enjoy some cheese and mimosas at the Centerville Dot Market.

Kappy Kilburn - \$39 to recognize Human Race Theater Company unveiling of the 39<sup>th</sup> Season tonight at the Loft Theatre.

Jean Maychack - \$100 for her birthday for the Red Ribbon Project

Kim Spurgeon - \$100 for Red Ribbon for her birthday and in recognition of the Rotarians who participated in this year's Rotary Reads project.

Suren Singhvi - \$100 for his safe return from 2 months in India

Frank Scott presented Steve Naas with his pin and memento recognizing him as a major donor to the Rotary International Foundation. He was recognized not only for his donations but the generosity of his time in contributing to the technology for the club and the youth exchange program.

Bill Nance did a Peace Builder interview of Tom Webb, Associate Vice President of Accessibility and ADA /504 coordinator, Office of Disability Services Wright State University. Tom came to the area about 10 years ago from DC. Wright state is rated #3 in the U.S. in being the "most accessible campus with accessibility services. Tom is hoping to work his way out of a iob and works hard across the university to bring awareness

and change to the planning, design, and construction of buildings, courses and anything that may help reduce the barriers to education of people with disabilities. This falls into the peace category because it helps with peace to people who may be otherwise overlooked in traditional educational settings.

Jack Lobeck was chair of the day and introduced Jeff Hoagland, President and CEO of Dayton Development Coalition. Jeff provided an update on the regional economic conditions of the Miami Valley. DDC covers a 14-county area and focuses on three major areas of interest such as economic development, support for Wright Patt Air Force Base and federal advocacy. Jeff talked about the metropolitan market that includes 1.9 million people from Auglaize County to Montgomery County to almost Franklin Co. Jeff provided trends and economic analysis of how the region is much stronger from where it was in 2012. Highlights of Jeff's presentation are noted below.

- Our region led the state in job creation: 5212 Jobs created in 2023 in DDC region vs. 3248 in Columbus in second place.
- Past 3 years our region has crated more than 15,400 new jobs and retained 15,80 jobs, capital investment from those projects totaled \$7.45 billion, 491 regional wins 2011 through 2023.
- The job growth in the region continues with Advanced Manufacturing, Aerospace and Aviation, Automotive, Food Sciences and Agriculture, Healthcare, Information Services and Software, Logistics and Distribution being the leading sectors. Numerous DDC projects and leads are in the pipeline in these and other sectors.
- In comparison to 2011, regional population has grown by 3.9%, jobs have increased by 6.6%, unemployment rate is lowered by 3.8%, per capita income is up 32.6% and median household income is up 28.7%.
- A summary of Honda and Joby were highlighted and Ohio and the DDC region competed well and won.
- Why Dayton ? Proximity to WPAFB is key to this success and having sites available is key to success of attracting and winning new
  projects. Have not seen manufacturing of full aerospace here since WW2. Always had the office jobs, now getting the manufacturing
  jobs.

The DDC hosts an annual meeting and the 41st Annual Fly-in to DC is coming up at the end of the month. DDC also hosts the NCAA First Four Big Hoopla as a March-Madness Celebration Kickoff each year. DDC also does a lot of stuff with the Dayton Dragons, the arts, and making the military experience better for military families and support services.

In response to the question of what the biggest threat to our region is, Jeff responded that  $it \hat{a} \in \mathbb{T}^m$ s all about workforce. The region has a lot of people who can retire and we need to get high school students, community colleges and tech centers to get students attracted to non-degree programs. There are several non-degree jobs that pay \$75k/year. DDC is working with Wright State, UD and Cedarville University and others to bridge this gap, but more action is needed to close the workforce gap.

President Bramlage reminded us that next week is Red Ribbon Takeover; She led us in the 4-way test and adjourned the meeting.


