President's Message

The new-this-year special event committee, led by Chas Woodhull, has been working hard behind the scenes to put together our Club's first-ever SUMMERFEST event for this September 21.

Here's the background and info on how we got to this point…



As you have heard me say many times, the membership of our club has changed over the years and now reflects the make-up of the business community in more diverse ways. For many years, our membership was made up of leaders from big for-profit companies like NCR and others.

Funding for our Foundation used to come solely from the members of the Club, and many of those members had deep pockets. Our members, and the big for-profit companies in the Dayton area, financially supported the Foundation on a very large scale for many years. This is how and why our Dayton Rotary Foundation currently has assets of \$900,000 in its endowment and is able to give up to 4% of the assets to provide grants to local non-profits. Annually, we are able to use

our endowment payout along with the generosity of our current members. Each year we are able to donate approximately \$50,000 to local nonprofit organizations and support other important projects.

As the membership of the Club has changed, however, we want to look at additional ways to continue funding the Foundation in the future. Our club is now made up of some corporate members as well as many non-profits, small business owners, and people from the community that may be retired or just beginning their careers. The Foundation will need to begin looking to other funding sources in the future, beyond our own Rotarian members who may not have the same deep pockets as former members did.

This type of special event, (similar in concept to Oakwood Rotaryâ $\in$ <sup>TM</sup>s That Day in May), with the potential to grow and expand into a true fundraising event, is one way that we feel we can do something unique in Dayton thatâ $\in$ <sup>TM</sup>s raising support â $\in$ <sup>TM</sup>form the Community and for the Communityâ $\in$ <sup>TM</sup>. The idea is to increase awareness of our club, the Dayton Rotary Foundation and eventually gain new members AND raise funds from others, not just our own members.

Coincidentally, the City of Dayton recently decided not to host the three music festivals as they $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$  we done in past years. The opportunity for US to provide a fun, family-friendly music event for the community seems  $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$  meant to be  $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$  with the help of Lisa Wagner at the Levitt Pavillon, and the other committee members, we are thrilled to have commitments from three well-known local groups who will draw fans from diverse areas of the community. And, this gives our Club a chance to share our story and mission with the folks that still think  $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{N}$  Dayton Rotary an old, men-only group? $\hat{a} \in$  and those who have no idea at all what our Rotary Club of Dayton is all about.

Expanding on this thought is to meld the feel-good motivation with the pragmatic approach of angel investing in Real Estate development.

Kim Bramlage asked Frank Scott to remove Matt Jessup's red ribbon- Congratulations Matt for accomplishing all of those Red Ribbon tasks.

President Kim introduced Andrea Wall, Cathy Gardner and Kelly Lehman who worked on the Youth Peace events. They shared that the District Peace Initiative is collaborating with NCCJ. NCCJ has expanded their mission in the last few years to all sorts of areas with a goal to eliminate bias, bigotry and discrimination in the area. The program has been targeting high school students. In March, 80 students attended a session. In April there was another day with part of the day, a tour of the American Journey, the black experience in America done by Michael Carter and it is located at Sinclair. In the afternoon, the students were at the Peace Museum and they are making a mosaic that will be a peace pillar. Mark your calendar for October 22 as the students will be at Wright State. Volunteers will be needed. The District funded this project with 8,000 this year and has only designated 3,000 next year so the Dayton Club or Foundation could be a source of support for next year.

Karla Garrett Harshaw noted two presentations today, both monuments recognizing heroes in our community. She introduced Chief Porter who has served 27 years on the force and became Chief of Butler Township in September 2016. Also present were Ken Betz, Miami Valley Crime Lab and Chief Althause, Vandalia Police Chief.

Chief Porter shared a video and information about a Montgomery County Law Enforcement Memorial. The group was formed in 2007 and they have three focus areas; an annual event to honor the fallen officers, 6 scholarships a year, support for families and other officers and to build a memorial to honor the 48 local officers that have died in the line of duty. A site has been identified at 601 Riverside, by the Masonic Temple. The project is estimated to cost 1.7 million. A design has been created. Chief Porter shared a flyer with a picture of the proposed memorial and information. Donations can be made and details can be found at mcmemorial.com

Karla Garrett-Harshaw talked about a memorial to honor the 40 Medal of Honor folks from Montgomery County and contiguous counties. The Wright Dunbar group has made this a special focus area because they want to honor those that have received this highest honor and Dayton is a city with ties to the military. They have a location at Edwin C Moses and Third St and this would be the gateway to the Wright-Dunbar neighborhood. The WW1 and 2 Gold Star Mother's Memorials would be there as well. Cost of the Project is estimated to be 1.5 million and they have raised 1.1 million. The Veteran's Service Commission in Montgomery and Miami County, the City of Dayton, the Montgomery County Commissioners and local Foundations and donors have contributed. The Park will be named, Honor Park. The project is on course to be finished in the Spring of 2025. A pamphlet and information was shared. Donations can be made at the Dayton Foundation.
