PROGRAM

Bill MacDonald introduced our guest speaker today. Dr. Virginia Cope is an associate professor of English at OSUN. Dr. Cope will present on Mardi Gras Indians.

The Mardi Gras Indians are a black parading culture in New Orleans. In their neighborhoods each year, they build elaborate suits in which they parade and encounter other tribes. It involves art and community and dance and music. A few years ago, Dr. Cope took a group of students to New Orleans for a service project. Their project built a web site, involving 18 interviews that have turned into 3 different documentaries.

Every year they build these suits, which take an entire year to create. Different neighborhoods have different ways of building the suits, but they all tell stories. This began as a way to honor American Indians who helped enslaved African Americans.

Each tribe is led by a "Big Chief" whose suit is compared to other Big Chiefs' suits to declare whose is prettiest.

Beginning in 2014, Dr. Cope started taking students down to New Orleans. "Spirit Leads My Needle" is the first documentary, in which the Big Chiefs talk about their traditions and obstacles they've faced.

In 2016, another group went down to New Orleans and worked with the women in the tribes. Women can be Oueens in the tribes.

Hurricane Katrina disproportionately hit the tribes, but on Mardi Gras day, some Indians managed to come back, find their suits, dry them out, and parade. It became a symbol of resilience. Since then, various museums have honored this tradition. As a result of that trip, the second documentary was made called "It's Your Glory".

During the pandemic, the Mardi Gras Indian community was hit hard because it is centered around gathering. Mardi Gras took place in 2020 one week before the nation shut down and it became a superspreader event. In 2022, another group of students went down to learn about the effects of the pandemic on the Mardi Gras Indians. "Othermothering" was extended throughout the pandemic. In 2022, the tribes paraded again and many of the suits reflected the hardships of the pandemic. The third documentary "Masked for Battle" was released and it is now airing on WYES.
