News of Interest - Polio Eradication

The Use of Solar Power in the fight to end Polio November 20, 2023

Nearly 1 billion people globally are served by health care facilities that do not have regular or consistent power. Unreliable energy disrupts routine and emergency care—from running diagnostic tests to ensuring vaccines stay cold. Heatwaves, floods, and other extreme weather events cause energy disruptions, and are expected to increase. To address these challenges in the last mile of polio eradication and reduce its carbon footprint, the GPEI and partners have turned to solar power, a more affordable, reliable and climate-resilient energy source to power polio vaccination and surveillance activities.

Solar powered vaccine refrigerators

For decades refrigerators powered by fossil fuels like kerosene or petrol were essential to maintaining vaccines at just the right temperature. Yet, these refrigerators emitted greenhouse gasses and were relatively expensive to operate, plus were vulnerable to disruptions in the national energy supply. Solar Direct Drive (SDD) vaccine refrigerators can run for days without power if needed, not only making them more dependable, but also extending the programme's reach in some of the most difficult yet critical areas to end polio.
