

Rotary International Leads Program

- A non-Rotarian goes to the RI website and expresses interest in learning more about Rotary and what Rotary opportunities may be available.
- That generates a lead that is distributed by Rotary, based on geography, to the District Membership Chair of the local district.
- The DMC contacts the prospective member and based on preferences and interests, matches them with the local club that best fits.
- A Rotary or Rotaract club member will contact them by e-mail or phone to discuss their interest in Rotary. The'll get invited to get to know the club better by attending a meeting, social or service project.
- Once they show interest in the club, by spending some time with the club and it's determined that they are a good fit for the club, they'll be invited to join.
- A dignified induction ceremony will be scheduled and they are a member!
- The club will engage them by encouraging them to join a committee, lead a service project or organize a social event...in other words they will be fully involved as their personal expectations and needs are met.

Fact: Over 71,000 Rotary International leads were generated last year... nearly 70% were never referred to a club!
That will not happen in this District!

District Membership Committee ask: When/if a lead is distributed to your club, work the system and follow through with the prospect...create a new Rotarian!

GANESHOTSAV - An Indian festival for promoting Peace and Harmony - Celebrated in South Florida every year.

Ganesh Chaturthi is the birthday of Lord Ganesha, (an Indian deity). This year it fell on 18 September 2023. People in India bring idols of Lord Ganesha (also known as Elephant Head Deity) to their communities, worship for about 10 days and then immerse the idol in the ocean, river, or pond. During these 10 days, people get together and celebrate, with various entertainment programs such as music, dance, drama etc. Ganeshotsav became a public event during 1890s when an Indian freedom fighter Lokmanya Balgangadhar Tilak organized such public gatherings in every community to discuss about the need for freedom from the British Rule, which was finally attained in 1947. Since 1890s this festival has been used for peaceful gatherings.

I started this festival in South Florida in 1995. Since we do not get large idols here, I started making idols out of paper, such as newspapers and magazines etc, so that immersion in water would not cause any pollution. It usually takes me about a month to make this idol. Since I use paper for building this idol, I insert pages from my company brochure in it. The page with my picture goes on His chest, with my picture strategically placed on His heart. Gives me a kick indeed!

The idol is made in my patio, a full human size, and then taken to our Temple in Perine area, where celebrations take place for 11 evenings before immersing the idol in the ocean. Every evening there are 30 minutes devoted to children and adults to showcase their talent in music, classical dance, drama, and a lot more. One of the evenings during celebrations in the Temple, I dedicate to the presentation of Rotary Club Miami Airport, to inform about Rotary in general and the Rotary Grants. I have been doing this since 2017. As a result, the majority of my Club members I have found during this program every year.

My first Global Grant, Gift of Sight, also came from a member of the Temple who heard about our Healthy Tiny Feet District Grant that my Club members presented in 2019, and he donated the required \$10,000 for a Global Grant. When we go to the beach for the final immersion of the idol, a good part of Indian Community gathers there at one of the shelters. We have had a crowd of over 300 people at times, before Covid -19. We also display Rotary banners at the beach while we are having music and Indian dances to attract the attention of beach goers. This provides a good exposure of Rotary.

Ganeshotsav every year helps us, at Rotary Club Miami Airport, to build our membership, promote peace and harmony (one of the seven areas of focus in Rotary Service) and provides resources for our Global Grants and District Grants. The same model can be tried in other places of worship where people congregate weekly. If any club would like to do so, I will be happy to assist.

On 24 October, we will all have dinner at 6 p.m. in our respective countries and cities.

We'll all be having dinner to support a cause on the 24th, so any form of participation is welcome, whether it's clubs meeting in restaurants or even from your own homes.

ROTARY CLUB OF WESTON'S COMMITMENT TO GLOBAL POLIO ERADICATION IS STRONGER THAN EVER!



In the 35 years since Rotary International made a promise of "A Polio Free World," more than one million Rotary members have helped advocate and raise funds for Polio vaccines, including going to the most remote places to administer the vaccine. Polio eradication is currently the signature cause for Rotary International due to the magnitude of the challenge and the historic importance of eradicating this debilitating and sometimes fatal disease.

This crusade started in 1985 when Rotary International decided to start this fight and partner with governments and international organizations. At the time, the world was facing more than 350,000 Polio cases per year, affecting primarily children under 5 years of age, and the disease was present in more than 122 countries. Now, after years of worldwide initiatives and millions of hours of volunteer service, more than 2.5 billion children have received the Polio vaccine. As a result, more than 16 million people can live normal healthy lives because they were protected from Polio and its potential

to cause significant disability, paralysis, or even death.

Though the world is currently 99.9%. Polio free, Polio is still present in 2 countries: Afghanistan & Pakistan. These countries continue to remain endemic and unable to eradicate the virus, facing pockets of infection and circulating wild Poliovirus. The total number of wild polio virus cases in these two countries is small, however, with fewer than 10 cases during 2023. The strategy is to reach the most remote places with a goal of reaching the "zero-dose children" – children who have never received a dose of the Polio vaccine and are therefore at a higher risk of contracting the virus.

Pollo is a distant memory for many people given that it was eradicated in the United States in the 70s and in many other countries in the 80s. However, Rotary International has kept Polio's history relevant by making it a priority as one of our most important humanitarian causes. The strategy is very clear, and a group of affected and neighboring countries are following a successful model. Rotary has formed a successful partnership with The World Health Organization, Unicef, The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, and the



local governments that covers everything from vaccine production and distribution, surveillance, and geographical data analysis to the last step, a trustable vaccine carrier. This is where an "accepted" member of the local society, local women, and health workers work together to handle cultural barriers. Volunteers have climbed mountains and traveled in boats and on animals in their efforts to reach all children!

Every year Rotary International commits \$150 million to the Polio Eradication effort, and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation matches \$2 for every \$1 that is raised. It is estimated that at least one million Rotary Members directly contribute toward funding the Polio eradication effort. Locally, Rotary Club of Weston has remained highly supportive of the Polio eradication cause, raising thousands of dollars for this effort every year. Last year alone we raised more than \$19,000 for Polio, which, after factoring in the matching contribution from the Gates Foundation, resulted in the creation of over 95,000 Polio vaccines.

Our work as Rotary members will continue until Polio is completely eradicated. Rotary Club of Weston will stay committed to these efforts until we are a Polio Free World!

We are hosting a family-friendly movie night at the Fort Lauderdale Savor Cinema with a special viewing of the movie, "Singin' in the Rain", a spectacular Musical with Debbie Reynolds and Gene Kelly.

The event will include an eco-friendly food truck, mixed drinks, sodas, popcorn and other movie treats, all for purchase. There will be time to socialize before the show, and the grand finale will feature a pick-a-prize raffle with lots of great prizes. Our goal is to fill 200 seats and raise thousands of dollars for the cause. In fact, \$10 of every \$12 admission ticket and all raffle proceeds will go directly to the End Polio Now fund.

About the Film

Have you ever been told "no"?
Have you ever been told "you can't?"
Have you ever been told, "that's not possible?"
Linn Hendershot heard it ... repeatedly.
And he proved them wrong every time.

This documentary is about Linn Hendershot, a Polio survivor—who defied the odds again and again to effect change and make a difference.

At a time when disabled populations were considered "crippled" and doomed to a life of inertia, Linn used the powers of perseverance and persuasion to destroy those perceptions to break into sports and racing—industries that would normally shut him out.



He served a lead role on the 1996 Atlanta Olympics Committee on Disability Access—going up against the Goliath of money and power—and coming out a winner with many improvements made to ensure the venues were more accessible. He not only defied the odds of survival, recovering in a hospital from severe pneumonia, but he spearhead the creation of a computer lab and a therapeutic garden while he was there so he and his fellow patients could connect with the outside world.

Linn made it known that he wasn't here to make a career, he was here to make a difference...and with the help of family and friends...he did.

LVIV, UKRAINE ROTARY LEADERSHIP

What must be one of Rotary's greatest examples of leadership at the club level came from Lviv, Ukraine when Russia opened its second front for invading Ukraine. From the outset in late February 2022, the Rotary Club of Lviv International showed tremendous leadership in what may be called crisis management. Members called throughout the Rotary world asking for support. A network was established to receive supplies from throughout Europe and elsewhere. Truck convoys lined the highways leading to Ukraine. Warehousing in Lviv was provided for redistribution in Ukraine. Trucks entered war zones delivering principally medical supplies. Accounts were maintained in Germany and Poland to receive funds and immediately purchase supplies. Time was of essence. It still is.

Our District 6990 started giving from the beginning. Funds were sent to Lviv Rotary's German and Poland accounts for immediate use. The Rotary Foundation also received money for later distribution in Ukraine. Our district raised for TRF over \$27,000. Direct funding was larger. From the initial donations from the Rotary Clubs of South Miami and Marathon the Rotary Club of Weston soon gave an exceptional sum toward the purchase of a fire truck. Those clubs and others sent money directly to Europe. Today, the Rotary Club of Lviv International maintains a local account through an intermediary Austrian bank. Now, supplies using American dollars can make purchases in Ukraine at greater savings. By August 2023 RCLI announced having raised over \$5,000,000. Our District Governor Barbara Gobbi set up a website which includes means to donate toward the humanitarian effort in Ukraine.

In August it was an honor to host the immediate past president of RC Lviv International, Natalia Dolinska. With the excellent coordination provided by RC Marathon past president Keith Douglass and the welcoming by RCM's president Sam Williams and membership, Rotarian Dolinska was warmly received. Home hospitality was generosity provided by Keith and Diane Douglass. A near capacity audience of Rotarians and guests from Key Largo to Key West heard Natalia speak of Lviv Rotarians' ongoing work saving lives. At the end RCM presented its third donation. Recently, Keith mentioned club attendance is up and so is bringing in new members. Natalia left her mark.

Deserved mentioning is while Natalia was here her son was in high school on a brief student exchange. She returned to Houston to address Rotary clubs in Texas and then to Lviv with son in September. At a recent virtual meeting of RCLI Keith and I heard the highest accolades by Texas Rotarians given Natalia. We concurred. Frankly, it is hard to imagine a finer ambassador for Rotary and Ukraine.





Putting people at the center of care

The <u>Declaration of Alma-Ata</u> made by the World Health Organization in 1978 called world leaders to come together to deliver better health for all. The vision of the Declaration of Alma-Ata was to change how we think about health, moving away from focusing on diseases and towards recognizing that health is not only about illness and services but more importantly about empowering individuals, caring for the person, and placing people at the center of care. However, forty years later, that vision has gone largely unfulfilled. Primary health care is in crisis, and half the world's population has no access to the most essential health services. According to the United Nations, unclean water and poor sanitation are the leading cause of child mortality; hunger and malnutrition are the number one health risk worldwide. One in ten people in developing regions still lives on less than US\$1.90 a day – the internationally agreed poverty line, and around 10 percent of the world population is living in extreme poverty and struggling to fulfill the most basic needs like health and education.

To respond to complex public health issues, the <u>CDC</u> provides valuable guidance through a multi-level model of factors affecting health. From macro to micro levels, the four strata of this model are: societal, community, relational and individual levels, with the individual placed at the center of everything. This broad approach to thinking of health, advanced in the 1947 Constitution of the World Health Organization, includes physical, mental and social well-being. Because of this, we decided to take action and form the Rotarian Public Health Fellowship to connect with our fellow members, because together we can make a difference.

For example, Rotary International, the World Health Organization, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, UNICEF and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation have been working together in the <u>Global Polio Eradication Initiative</u> through a people-centered public health initiative. By focusing on understanding people's needs and beliefs, and engaging community leaders, the Global Initiative has been able to work with communities to best administer vaccines. And through this way, we are reaching our goal of eradicating polio from the world.

According to the Health Innovation Network, person-centered care "is a way of thinking and doing things that sees the people using health and social services as equal partners in planning, developing and monitoring care to make sure it meets their needs. This means putting people and their families at the center of decisions and seeing them as experts, working alongside professionals to get the best outcome." The International College of Person-Centered Medicine states: "Person-centered medicine is dedicated to the promotion of health as a state of physical, mental, socio-cultural and spiritual wellbeing as well as to the reduction of disease, and founded on mutual respect for the dignity and responsibility of each individual person." And at a global level, one way WHO defines people-centered care is as "An approach to care that consciously adopts individuals', families', and communities' perspectives as participants in and beneficiaries of trusted health systems, that respond to their needs and preferences in humane and holistic ways. People-centered care also requires that people have the education and support they need to make decisions and participate in their own care. 
