March 27 - Tommi Marsans Associate Director, Marketing Technology, Verizon Business Group

President Jamie introduced our guest speaker Tommi Marsans. Aformer member of the North Stafford Rotary, recruited by DG Rene, Tommi is currently between clubs because of her work in Northern Virginia. She addressed the concerns people have with AI:

- ❖ Job loss
- The danger of AI taking over human life.

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Tommi explained that at its core, AI is a tool, and she gave examples of AI driven applications in our daily lives: Echo, Alexa and Siri; photo filters; online banking fraud detection. In these examples the computer program is always learning, becoming more perfectly tailored to your personal preferences.

She described it in terms of a conversation between the customer and the AI tool, which has access to the customer's profile, account, and everything that it has learned from actions or purchases to lead them further along in the journey. She shared a story of her recently giving a speech that was entirely generated by AI. No one in the audience had a clue until she told them.

Here are some insights she shared:

- Testing is imperative. Errors need to be detected quickly. She discussed the importance of training the AI model by continually asking it something and rewarding it when it delivers good outcomes, watching the tool improve and evolve over time.
- ❖ AI is only as dangerous as you train it. Machine learning works just as humans learning works, but much faster.
- ❖ AI Justice. Machines can discriminate in harmful ways. We often assume machines are neutral, but they aren't. There is a large gender and racial bias in AI systems sold by tech giants like IBM, Microsoft, and Amazon. Tommi discussed "baked in" bias towards an outcome, inadvertently influencing the AI behavior and encouraging it to repeat the same approach each time, rather than an innovative approach to a problem. The solution is to build in some novelty to push the tool to provide completely different ways to reach an outcome.

Tommi said that ethical AI training should follow the "Four Way Test".

During the lively Q&A session Tommi covered the sources used by generative AI. Our computer searches become part of the sources used by AI. Here are some memorable quotes from Tommi:

- * "If it's free, the price you pay is your information."
- "Technology is outpacing our ability to govern it."
- "Your world is being curated."
- * "Expectations of privacy are almost entirely absent in the younger generation."

My Purpose, Passion in Rotary – And Pet Portraits

Extraordinary. Amazing. Spectacular.

This is how I feel about Rotary. I'll be 90 years old in June and joined Rotary at a relatively late age. I went on my first volunteer trip to Guatemala in 2006 to help install stoves for Mayan families. Those stoves changed their lives, and the experience changed mine.

As we installed stoves, I enjoyed talking with the families and asked them what other assistance would be helpful. Most often, someone would reply that clean drinking water would be the most significant improvement. I promised them I would help, and that became my purpose in Rotary.

When you reach my age, you realize that without a purpose, you are like a rudderless boat. Purpose with a capital "P" gives one the excitement to live. I learned how Rotary Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) grants worked and began putting them together. I realized these grants could be extraordinarily impactful because they used both district funds and matching funds from The Rotary Foundation.

I approached other clubs in my district and elsewhere in the U.S. and Canada. Amazingly, the idea caught on. Soon, we were doing grants for clean water all over the world. As of 2023, these water projects have helped more than 2 million people in 34 countries. If that's not spectacular, I don't know what is! My Purpose has become a Passion. I think about it day and night.

Since it worked once, I'm trying it again. My new Passion is to help kids with cleft lip and palate deformities. When I retired in 2000 after a career as a stockbroker with Merrill Lynch, I took an adult education class in oil painting and got hooked. I use only one palette knife and no brushes. I now use the hobby to support cleft palate surgeries. I have painted almost 800 pet portraits to raise money for this cause. The funds go to support Rotary global grants. It breaks my heart to see kids in that condition, and thankfully, Rotary allows me to help change their lives. Before the surgeries, they are outcasts. They have a hard time eating and drinking. Surgeries fix all that, which brings me great joy and happiness.

It wouldn't have happened without a Purpose that became my Passion. My excitement keeps me going – even at 90.
