Focus on Foster Care

The month of May is National Foster Care Month. As a Child Advocate for many years in Maryland, I helped provide legal representation to children who were victims of child abuse and neglect, and who were involved in the State's

Foster Care System. This Month we are placing an intense spotlight on children in care. Many are languishing in both the Maryland and Washington, DC child welfare systems, and some children "age



out†of the system, and never have the opportunity to connect to a caring adult, or to be adopted by a loving family.



The District Foster Care Committee and the Rotary Club of Washington, DC, under the leadership of District Committee Chair Sofia DeMartino and Club President Lisa Cohen respectively, have coordinated several events for District Rotarians to support. Our vision for this year was to educate District 7620 members on the importance of helping foster care children. We wanted to encourage District Clubs to support financially, or to donate items or clothing to these special children in our

communities. Most foster care children are overlooked every single day, and do not have the most basic of needs which we as Rotarians readily have at our disposal. If you wish to volunteer or support these foster care activities,

The Maryland club's South Africa Ambassador Jonathan Warner currently serves as Secretary of the Karoo club, and Past Carroll Creek Rotary Club President Ashley Waters and International Committee member Richard Foot are Affiliate Members of the Karoo club, participating monthly in the virtual meetings via Zoom. Since its inception, the Karoo club has channeled



its energies in a triad of youth-oriented public health initiatives - Education and Prevention around Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders, Menstrual Hygiene Management, and Gender-based Violence education and prevention.



Parole Rotary Foundation Gives \$30,000 in Grants

Sunday, April 21, 2024



The Parole Rotary Foundation, Inc. will be distributing \$30,000 in grants to 12 local charities from across Anne Arundel County. This year the Parole Rotary received 45 applications. The Parole **Rotary Foundation Grants** Program seeks to address issues of food security, family well-being, and academic achievement by funding projects that serve the needs of children and families in the areas of education, health, and the arts. The applications were scored based on Community Impact, Potential for Success and

how aligned the agency is with the Foundation's goals. Awards range from \$1,000 to \$3,000 and will be distributed at upcoming Parole Rotary meetings. This will be an opportunity for the agency representatives to meet those whose volunteer work raised the funds their agency will be receiving. The Grants Committee chair is Paul Racette, who worked with a team of Rotarians to review all the applications and narrow them down to the selection of award recipients.

Capitol Hill Rotary Club Supports DC Foster Children at 2024 Youth Summit

The Rotary Club of Capitol Hill assisted the Foster and Adoptive Parents Advocacy Center (FAPAC) in Washington, DC with their Second Annual Youth Summit April 6 and 7, 2024. The Youth Summit focuses on young adults in the DC foster care system as they approach aging out of the system. The Rotary Club of Capitol Hill provided volunteers at the



summit and connected the organization to another non-profit organization, Operation Hope, to provide financial literacy training for summit attendees.









Dr. Ila Shah: One Person Making a World of Difference



At the April 28 meeting of 28 internationally-minded, District club members and their guests, Dr. Ila Shah aptly demonstrated how one person can change the lives of others around the world. Hosted by the international service committees of the Rotary Club of Parole and the Rotary Club of Annapolis, the meeting also included representatives from the Rotary Club of Baltimore; the Rotary Club of Washington, D.C.; the Rotary Club of Washington Global; and the Rotary Club of Charlotte Hall.

Nearly 30 years ago, Dr. Shah, a retired pediatrician, joined the Rotary Club of Charlotte Hall, and after seeing the crippling effects of polio on young children, set her sights on relieving the pain and suffering of thousands. The ravages of polio in children in her

native India ignited her passion to serve the underserved. She wassoon sponsoring rehabilitative surgeries and

prosthetics that permitted the young victims to walk again. How did she do it? She said she became a "professional beggar,†requesting funding for the polio surgeries from everyone she knew. And it worked!

But Dr. Shah did not limit her efforts to polio. Through over 30 Rotary global grants, Dr. Shah has provided clean water, toilets for schools, solar power, pre-natal care, gynecological services, corneal transplant and cataract surgeries, and benches for schools. Read More



In Memoriam: Past District Governor Dr. John L. Sever

It is with sadness that I share news of the passing of Past District Governor Dr. John Sever of the Rotary Club of Potomac.

Dr. Sever was born and raised in Chicago, Illinois, and joined Rotary in 1964 in Potomac, Maryland. He served as Club President from 1969-1970, and was our District Governor during Rotary Year 1978-1979.

As many of you may know, Dr. Sever is widely known as the Father of the Polio Initiative. His contributions to eradicating the disease have been immeasurable. Dr. Sever is known world-wide for his work with infectious diseases, and also Pediatrics, Obstetrics and Gynecology.

Dr. Sever was married. He and his beautiful wife, Gerane, raised three daughters together; Kimberly, Beverly and Valerie.

The funeral will held on June 1 at 3pm at Ingleside at King Farm, 701 King Farm Blvd., Rockville. In lieu of flowers, donations may be made to the Rotary Polio Plus Program.


Marilyn Nevy Cruz (Washington DC) and Ashley Waters (Carroll Creek) Received Major Awards
