CLUB REPORT JANUARY 25, 2024

anaging several learning pathways, serving the needs of a large number of homeless students, teaching a highly transient student population and providing programming to many students whose first language is not English, are among the daily challenges in the New London Public Schools. Despite these challenges, a dedicated faculty and staff and an engaged and smart student body, make leading the district extremely rewarding, the city's schools superintendent said.

"There's a new challenge every day, but it's really rewarding work to see the kids thrive," **Dr. Cynthia Ritchie**, New London's superintendent of schools, told members of the New London Rotary Club at the regular meeting Jan. 25.

Ritchie said the district has three learning pathways visual and performing arts, international education and



STEM (science, technology, engineering, math). The three pathways are a streamlined version of a former plan to have individual tracks at each school in the district. Ritchie said, however, the earlier plan proved to be too costly to implement, not sustainable and somewhat chaotic.

Currently, the STEM pathway is in place and incorporates learning at both Bennie Dover Jackson Middle School and New London High School, she said. The visual and performing arts track begins at Nathan Hale Elementary and those students then go directly to the high school campus, where they are housed in a distinct area of the school.

The international education pathway developed after determining that an earlier plan to have the district be part of the acclaimed International Baccalaureate program was not a good fit for the city. Ritchie said the IB program is very costly and requires 100% staff training at all times, which can be challenging.

The current international education pathway begins at Jennings Elementary School and incorporates many career pathways and partnerships with local businesses and industries, Ritchie said. There are partnerships and programming for students who want to go directly into the workplace after high school graduation, as well as preparation for those students planning to head to college.

Students in the international program can opt for training for manufacturing jobs, hairdressing and nail tech work,

the culinary arts and other fields. They also can connect to students in other countries such as China, she said.

Classroom innovation, a dedication to fully supporting all types and ages of students and operating under the vision of uniting in excellence has resulted in big gains in standardized test scores and state and national recognitions for the district, Ritchie said. Both Winthrop Elementary School and New London High School have been cited for excellence and Ritchie said the middle school has improved so dramatically that representatives of numerous other school districts will soon be visiting the school for a first-hand look.

Despite the gains and accolades, the school system also faces many challenges serving a population that includes many new immigrants, homeless families and many who live in poverty, Ritchie said. There are 600 special education students, some 330 homeless students and most students qualify for free or reduced lunches.

"The number of homeless students has tripled in the past several years," she said. "We watch this every day. We do a lot of work every morning to make sure every student has what they need."

In addition, the school system has dedicated special efforts to both the youngest students and those who are older than traditional high school-aged students. The preschool center that was opened with the help of COVID relief funds at the former BP Learned mission serves more than 80 students a day. The center also sponsors numerous family and community events in which some 200 families have participated, she said. The center provides families with items ranging from books and winter coats to car seats and diapers. Healthcare and other support services also are provided, Ritchie said.

At the other end of the age spectrum are older students, often new immigrants, who come to New London with little or no previous high school education. Because many of these students are parents and work full-time, attending traditional high school classes is not practical for them, Ritchie said. The district has established alternative pathways to earning a high school diploma for such students, she said.

"I'm really proud of our teachers and staff," Ritchie said. "The systems we've put in place are powerful and are working."
