CLUB REPORT FEBRUARY 8, 2024

Support for the offshore wind industry, a newly refurbished City Hall, a dedicated preschool facility and new housing developments and businesses throughout the city. These are among recent accomplishments that have bolstered the economy and desirability of New London, **Mayor Michael Passero** told members of New London Rotary on Feb. 8.

"When I first got elected, there really was nothing going on," Passero said while giving a "State of the City" address to the club.

But after two full terms as mayor and as he begins a third term, Passero said the city is making a lot of positive progress: it's attractive to developers, it's been the recipient of state and federal grants, the grand list is growing, many new residents are moving into the city and it is reclaiming its historical status as a focus of business and commerce in southeastern Connecticut.

"Our bond rating is up and for six years our taxes have been drifting lower," Passero said. "It's all because of the new investment in the city."

Passero said when he was first elected, the general opinion about New London among residents was that projects and plans usually fell through. But as more projects are successful, that feeling is waning.

"We've started to overcome the typical Whaler skepticism," he said.

Among the items that demonstrate the city's progress, Passero listed:

- A beautifully refurbished City Hall. Passero said he was first struck by the decrepit nature of City Hall when, in his first term as mayor, he was visited at the State Street building by the Coast Guard commandant.
- A strong job market led by two major employers: L&M Hospital and Electric Boat.
- The election of Martha Marx as state senator in the 20th District. For many years, the senate seat was held by a resident of one of the suburban towns in the district, most recently East Lyme and Waterford.
- The rebuilt State Pier that is supporting the offshore wind industry. Passero called the support of offshore wind "a bumpy ride," but said he and other key officials never lost faith in that project.

- Renovation at several city parks, including Green's Harbor Beach and Toby May Field. A major stormwater project at Green's Harbor has significantly decreased flooding onto Pequot Avenue in that area.

- Replacement of miles of crumbling sidewalks.
- The beginning of a project that will eliminate all lead water pipes in the city.
- A new preschool center in the former B.P. Learned mission property.
- A \$40 million community center now under construction at Ft. Trumbull.
- Redevelopment plans for The Day newspaper building and adjoining former bank building on Eugene O'Neill Drive. The buildings will be converted to housing and a boutique hotel featuring a rooftop bar with water views. A portion of Atlantic Street behind the buildings will be decommissioned and redeveloped as a park.

Passero said even with these accomplishments, there is still plenty of work ahead. He expressed frustration that some property owners continue to let their downtown buildings fall into disrepair, for example.

"We are still struggling with property owners who keep their buildings pretty decrepit, even though we have people lining up to buy pretty much any building downtown," he said. Even with that, Passero said he believes the downtown district is improving dramatically and by the summer there are expected to be new restaurants and a brew pub on Bank Street.

The waterfront is another area where work lies ahead, Passero said. Despite the city's long waterfront with a pedestrian walkway through the downtown district, there is no way for boats to tie up at most of the city's piers, he said.

"I would like to see a lot more maritime commerce on our waterfront," he said.

Passero praised the team of city officials who he said all have worked diligently to bring the many goals of the administration to fruition.

"We're working really hard toward our goals," he said.



New London Rotarians are helping brighten days for senior citizens in the city who are confined to their homes due to illnesses and mobility challenges. For Valentine's Day, the club assembled a small gift for the 55 shut-ins who get Meals on Wheels delivered to them through Thames Valley Council for Community Action. The gift consists of a Valentine lollipop and a card with a message that they are important and loved. The cards were made by children in the Boys and Girls Club overseen by the Salvation Army. The Valentines are the second gifts sent out to the seniors by the club. The first was delivered with Meals on Wheels at Christmas. Another gift is planned in time for the beginning of spring and spring holidays. Special thanks to Gigi Gonzalez-Cottrell for the cards, Anna Lathrop for the chocolate lollipops, Brian Cole for the Rotary stickers and TVCCA Meals on Wheels delivery people for including the gifts with the lunches they deliver.
