HENNY: A Legacy of Hope

Henny: A Legacy of Hope - profiles local Holocaust Survivor Henny Simon and her journey later in life to share her story to combat Holocaust deniers and antisemitism. The evening will be a celebration of her life with performances from internationally acclaimed pianist Emanuel Ax and the Eastern CT Symphony Orchestra and Chorus with European concert pianist Eva Virsik. The concert and Premiere is centered around participants and victims of WWII. The ECSO was founded by Victor Norman, a Jew who fled Nazi Europe and became the organist at Congregation Beth El. ECSO Conductor Toshi Shimada's father was detained in two Japanese internment camps and lost all his land. Toshi's wife Eva Virsik lost 16 relatives in Auschwitz. And we will honor Ben Cooper, a 102 year old WW II veteran and liberator of Dachau who was Henny's companion and love during the last years of her life. They often spoke together in schools.

ANCHORX CLUB REPORT FEBRUARY 22, 2024

ee Cole Chu introduced **Emmet Cosgrove**, speaking to us during Rotary's Peace and Conflict Prevention Month, on the cusp of Rotary's 119th anniversary. Emmet was a lawyer for 27 years, a presiding judge for 21 and has been a mediator for 2 years. Emmet told us that conflict is part of a society where we have free people who may have differing views. War, Emmet said, is resolving conflict through violence. Peace is not the absence of conflict but rather resolving it without physical, emotional or economic violence. How we resolve conflict is a vital part of civil society. Indeed, conflict can be valuable in addressing social differences. Emmet said that today we are surrounded by conflict. Just in the



legal system in Connecticut, there are 200,00 criminal cases, 60,000 civil civil disputes and 6,000 family disputes.

The goal is to resolve conflicts peacefully, not through violence. Quoting Einstein, Emmet said: "Peace cannot be kept by force, it can only be achieved by understanding."

Emmet explained there are three main processes of dispute resolution.

Lawsuits usually involve a court trial, either with a jury or before a judge. It is formal and public and involves lawyers. It may increase animosity. Litigation can take time, is often unpredictable, has risks, and can be expensive. And while he said the state's judges are very good, they may not always be experienced in a particular area of litigation.

Alternate dispute resolution processes are also available.

One is arbitration, where those on both sides agree to have a third party resolve their conflict and they agree to abide by the ruling. It is not done in court. Arbitration is often a clause in contracts. In arbitration, the sides have a choice of who the arbitrator is. It is less formal than a trial, quicker, and is not public.

Meditation is another tool for dispute resolution. A mediator is someone like Emmet who facilitates discussion and suggests creative solutions. Both sides agree on a neutral third-party to hear their dispute and provide guidance towards a resolution, crafted by both sides. It is private and usually quick. Mediation is not a binding ruling, just a way to get both sides to talk substantively and, hopefully, come a resolution that both will accept.

Both arbitration and mediation allow the parties to find someone who is experienced in the subject in dispute. Both methods are efficient and far more economical than a court trial. But, at times, trials are unavoidable.

Emmet cited several case he had dealt with as a judge and as a mediator. He told us that 95-99% of legal issues do not go to trial but are resolved either by arbitration or mediation. If one is in a situation that involves a legal conflict, Emmet said to consult an attorney for advice on which avenue to pursue to seek resolution.
