Rotary Around the World



United States

Most North American plant species depend on insects, predominantly bees, for pollination. "Your whole food web is supported by bees," says Dave Hunter, a member of the Rotary Club of Woodinville, Washington. The club leads a project that nourishes bees while beautifying the Seattle suburb. Members use donated wine barrels to construct planters to attract pollinators. Local businesses can sign up to have one placed at their storefront for a donation of \$150 a year to the club's foundation. The planters have QR codes that take visitors to information on the club's website about the program and pollinators' importance. "We are not just putting planters out; we're educating through them," says Hunter, proprietor of Crown Bees, which sells bees, bee houses, and other materials. The club also partnered with the city, businesses, a garden club, and a nonprofit organization to host a Pollinator Fest in May that attracted about 500 people to hear the latest buzz on bees.

ANCHORX CLUB REPORT MARCH 7, 2024

ris Magnussen, a Public Health Nurse and infection Preventionist at Ledge Light Health District spoke on the Rotary's March theme of "Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene". She shared how her experience living and working in Saudi Arabia in the early 80's exposed her to diseases never seen in the US mostly due to of the lack of water, poor sanitation, and hygiene especially with the Bedouins. We were reminded how lucky we are to have safe drinking water all thanks to the EPA and state regulations. One of the many roles of the sanitarians at Ledge Light Health District is to ensure that septic systems and wells are installed properly to protect against contamination.

Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene, known as WASH, is a focus of Rotary International. The Rotary Foundation works closely with the United Nations, USAID, and other organizations to improve WASH standards globally. Why is this a concern and focus of Rotary Foundation? First and foremost, access to safe water, sanitation and hygiene is the most basic human need for health and well-being. If people lack the basic needs to survive, there can't be well-being, social, educational, and economic development. Billions of people lack access to these basic services. Ms. Magnussen pointed out what happens when people do not have access to clean water, sanitation, and hygiene.

- **Diseases**: many diseases can be spread through the lack of clean water, sanitation, and hygiene. Hand hygiene, washing hands with soap and water for 20 seconds or using a 60% alcohol-based hand sanitizer is one of the easiest ways to prevent getting ill. Hand hygiene prevents about 50% diarrheal diseases and 20% respiratory illnesses. Hand hygiene also helps to prevent antibiotic resistance which is a big issue. When there is resistance, the antibiotic doesn't work anymore. Diseases such as polio, cholera, typhoid are just some diseases that can occur due to polluted water. If there is no soap and water to even wash their face, they can be at risk for trachoma that can lead to blindness.
- **Death**: The World Health Organization (WHO) study estimates that 1.4 million deaths could be prevented each year through improving access to safely managed water, sanitation, and hygiene services.
- Gender Inequality: Women and children tend to gather water which can be miles away that can keep



them from an education. Another issue is violence against women when going to communal toilets at night.

- **Malnutrition**: Many diseases, especially diarrheal, can lead to malabsorption of nutrients.
- Education: Schools without bathrooms make it difficult to attend, especially for young women.
- **Economy**: If people are ill, they can't work.

Some fun facts shared.

- Over the past 200 years, toilets have added 20 years to the human life span.
- More people in the world have access to mobile phones than toilets.
- The first flushable toilet was invented by John Harrington in 1591. He was the godson of Queen Elizabeth I and she tried the toilet and liked it so much she had one installed in the castle.
- Jack Sim, known as the #2 man, formed the World Toilet Organization and will be a featured speaker at the 2024 Rotary International Convention in Singapore.

The Rotary Foundation has invested in more than \$130 million in over 2000 projects worldwide. For every \$1 invested brings a return of \$4.30 in reduced health care costs. Ms. Magnussen remarked that this opened her eyes to the good work of the foundation and the importance of supporting it.
