The vision behind this award is to recognize employees in Edmonds who embody Rotary values in their home, work, and community. We could not be prouder to present this first award to Terra Mangum, DNP. Terra captures the essence of Rotary service in all realms of her life, selflessly serving others in a way that inspires us all. In her home life, through the years she and her husband Zach have opened their home to 25+ adolescent youth, helping several graduate from high school. As Steves discussed Terra's accomplishments, he quipped, "I can't think of anything more heroic than taking an adolescent into your home."

Professionally, Terra is an inspiration to her colleagues. Having earned her doctorate in adolescent medicine, she works at Virginia Mason Medical Center in Edmonds (formerly Edmonds Family Medicine) caring for families and supporting mothers as a lactation consultant. In her new role as Co-Section Head of their primary care leadership team, Terra is spearheading and elevating the roles nurse practitioners play in healthcare. Adrienne Miller is here to help. She can assist through her business, **Forever Care Services**. She

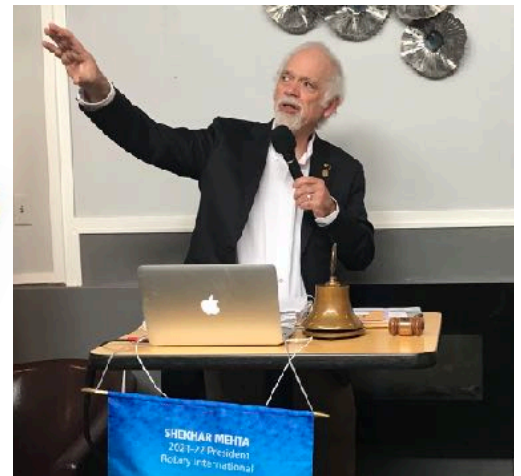

Ron Dotzauer is CEO of Strategies 360, but also serves as KOMO News Political Analyst. He gave us his take on the November elections, but also what he sees in the current climate, both in the State and well as nationally. Captain Kevin Coulombe, US Merchant Marine, ret., talked about Marine Transportation: the beating heart of the U.S. Economy. Many of us have already noticed the importance of marine transportation as we have seen so many empty shelves in our stores of late, due to the shortage of workers to unload at the ports. As Kevin explained the history of transport ships, he also explained the diversity of ship design today based on the specific cargo. In other words, a cargo ship is more than just a cargo ship. After 40 years of service, Captain Kevin walked down the gangway of the container ship MV Maersk Memphis in New Jersey, retired, and came home to Edmonds.

Celebrating International Women's Month

Women Pioneers in Edmonds

The election of Edmonds Mayor in December 1924 was expected to be a foregone conclusion with incumbent M. C. Engels having been re-nominated with no obvious opposition. However, on Election Day, the women of Edmonds began handing out stickers with the name of **Mrs. Alice U. Kerr**. When the final tally had been made, Mrs. Kerr had beaten Mr. Engels by a vote of 163 to 159.

Alice Kerr moved to Edmonds from Chicago in 1920. She was installed as Mayor of Edmonds in January 1925 and served in the position for one year. In October of that year, she clashed with the Edmonds City Council — of which George Brackett was a member — over pool and card rooms.

The council had prepared an ordinance to repeal all regulations affecting the practices and passed it with a five-to-two vote. Mrs. Kerr immediately vetoed but the vote was passed over her veto during the next session. After complaints were raised about dances in the basement of the Beeson building and Mrs. Kerr became critical of the events, a new ordinance covering card rooms, pool rooms and dances was introduced and passed in December 1925.

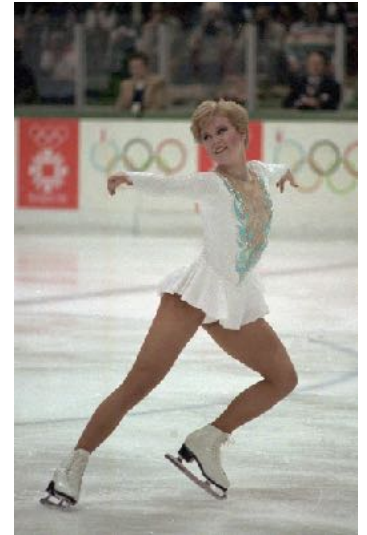
Mrs. Kerr also served as secretary of the National Baptist Association and was a member of the First Baptist Church in Edmonds. She passed away in 1949 at the age of 91. At the time of her passing, she was the first and only woman to have served as Mayor of Edmonds.

Olympic Champions in Edmonds

Rosalynn Sumners was raised in Edmonds. She won three straight national titles in figure skating from 1982 - 84, and was the World Champion in 1983, at the age of 19. She won the Silver Medal at the 1984 Olympic Games in Sarajevo, losing the Gold Medal to Katarina Witt by one tenth of a point. While her home town of Edmonds hailed her as a champion for her achievement, even naming one of the streets in downtown Edmonds "Rosalynn Sumners Boulevard", it took a number of years to overcome her own disappointment at not winning gold, feeling she had let people down. She signed on with Scott Hamilton's "Stars on Ice", where she finally came to realize some of the value in her accomplishment. She was inducted into the US Figure Skating Hall of Fame in 2001.



Women in Rotary

Jennifer E. Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, will become **Rotary International's President for 2022-23**, a groundbreaking selection that will make her the first woman to hold that office in the organization's history. Rotary International President-Elect, Jennifer Jones is the President of Media Street Productions Inc., a 25-year old, award-winning media company in Windsor, Ontario. Her talents have strengthened Rotary reach and impact, through many roles including as Trustee of the Rotary Foundation, RI Vice President, and co-chair of the End Polio Now: Make History Today campaign.

Working alongside political figures, celebrities and global leaders, she uses her voice to raise awareness and hundreds of millions of dollars to eradicate disease, support peace and provide clean water and sanitation in developing areas of the world. Her skill as an expert storyteller inspires hope and promise and motivates people to take action.

She has received many honours and recognitions including Rotary's Service above Self Award and the Citation for Meritorious Service, the YMCA Peace Medallion, the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal, and Wayne State University's Peacemaker of the Year Award – a first for a Canadian.
