PROGRAM

VANESSA MOOS introduced Rosa Mettler, Chief Operating Officer with Canopy Village. Mettler is a Licensed Clinical Social Worker and has been with the organization for over 10 years. From St. Maries, she was raised by her grandparents, and as a single mother, put herself through school to obtain Bachelor's and Master's degrees.

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month. You will see pinwheels all around town supporting the cause to raise awareness of the matter. The statistics in Idaho for 2024 show that 24,365 calls were made regarding child abuse. Of those, 9,553 were investigated with 2,252 for physical abuse, 763 for sexual abuse, 6,522 for neglect, 16 for human trafficking. Over 65 cases are opened per month in the five northern counties of the state.

Mettler showed an animated video about Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES) to help educate and further understand how childhood abuse experiences can relate to further health matters into adulthood. Higher risk children and adolescents can develop neurological and social problems, as well as have mental health challenges.

Prior to 18 years of age, intervention and preventative work is vitally important for the future outcomes of the individuals. If you encounter a dysregulated child, have compassion and empathy

for the youth. They need a kind voice, support and someone to believe in them and help them gain access to services.

When people step in and youth get help, it makes a huge difference. The direct result of a community stepping up to help is that you help youth before it gets too far and you help to prevent childhood abuse and further ACES. Canopy Village serves the greater Coeur d'Alene community with a variety of levels of care for youth. For youth that have been removed from their home by Health and Welfare/Child Protective Services, the average residential treatment stay is 222 days, and most do not go back to their families. The average respite stay is 2 days and there is also the emergency shelter, if needed. Canopy Village partners with law enforcement, Health and Welfare, CASA, and Safe Passage to assist the children and youth in need.
