This week please welcome Lane

EducationalServices District (Lane ESD)¹ Superintendent Tony Scurto and Assistant Superintendent Eric Anderson to our Club. Lane ESD supports all 16 public school districts in Lane County from the three larger metro districts of Eugene, Springfield, and Bethel schools to smaller districts such as Mapleton with approximately 150 students in K-12. Lane ESD Lane ESD provides their services to all of these districts. These services focus on four primary areas (links are active):

¹ ESDs are required in Oregon by Oregon Revised Statutes (ORS) 334 and there are currently 21 ESDs in Oregon. Most ESDs are organized by county.

About Eric:

In his current role at Lane ESD, Eric works with current ESD Superintendent Tony Scuto to administer Lane EDS Services to their primary clients: the 16 school districts in Lane County. Prior to his work as Lane EDS Assistant Superintendent, Eric worked at District 4J as the Director of Curriculum. In that role he was nominated for a *A Champion in Education* (ACE) award in 2023 by the Eugene Chamber of Commerce.

Eric is a University of Oregon alumni. He started his career as a special education teacher in Eugene 4J. His first assignment was at the alternative high school at Churchill. His first administrative position was the assistant principal at South Eugene High School in 2002. He moved on to be a principal at the elementary, middle, and high school level before becoming the 4J Curriculum Director. In 2023, he left 4J to become the Assistant Superintendent of Lane ESD.

About Tony:

Tony is a thirty-one year resident of Lane County. He holds a Master of Arts degree in Educational Administration from California State University, Northridge and a Bachelor of Arts degree from the University of California, Santa Barbara. He received his Continuing Administrator License from the University of Oregon.

Tony began his educational career in 1984 as a high school teacher and coach in the Antelope Valley in California. Moving to Oregon in 1993, he served as a school administrator at Coquille High School and then Sutherlin High School. Tony began his work in Lane County in 1995 when he was hired as Assistant Principal at Pleasant Hill High School. He then served in the principal role in the Pleasant Hill School District working at the elementary, junior high and high school levels. In 2008 Tony was the Pleasant Hill School District superintendent and served in that role until 2017.

Tony has been active on the Lane Oregon Leadership Network (LOLN), the Lane Workforce Partnership Board, the OASE Funding Coalition, and the Oregon Small Schools Association Board.

Common Man for Ukraine and Rotary Club of Eugene - a Connection that Works

To follow-up the great presentation by Common Man for Ukraine (CMU) co-founder Susan Mathison and Club member Jay Silverman's Matching Fund for CMU: As of this writing, Jay reported that our club had exceeded our match goal of \$4000 by \$100, meaning we raised \$8100 (so far) for the Plymouth New Hampshire Rotary's Common Man for Ukraine child rescue efforts. This money is now in the hands of CMU!

There is currently a just-returned team from Ukraine, having completed a massive distribution of kids' items to 21 villages. During their travels, and while in Kharkiv, Ukraine, a missile attack came very close to them. Here is an extract from an article on the CMU website (Common Man for Ukraine) about the attack:

Roughly 10 minutes after our Common Man for Ukraine team left a central square in Ukraine's besieged city of Kharkiv last weekend, Russian forces launched a deadly attack on that very square.

The close call marked a dramatic moment for the 12th humanitarian convoy led by the New Hampshire-based nonprofit <u>Common Man for Ukraine</u>, the four volunteers recounted as they traveled home Friday and pledged to return for a 13th trip.

"While we made it to safety, innocent Ukrainians were killed and many were wounded," said Common Man for Ukraine co-founder Lisa Mure. "We hear air raid sirens often on our convoys, but it's really become white noise for most Ukrainians. For the next hour or two after leaving the square, we heard both loud sirens and explosions. We knew pretty quickly that this time was different."

Still, <u>Common Man for Ukraine</u> and its Polish Rotary partners continued with their relief deliveries the following day as planned. On this trip, the volunteers delivered more than 64,000 pounds of food, solar lanterns, clothes, generators, and additional supplies to more than 5,000 children and their families spread throughout 16 villages in the Kharkiv Oblast in southeastern Ukraine.

"It's a sobering experience," co-founder Susan Mathison said of her 12th mission in the war zone. "As soon as we got out of our vans at the very first village the next morning, the air raid sirens were blaring again. But there's no time to be afraid. Hundreds of people were lined up waiting for us to arrive, waiting desperately for the food. There's no time to be afraid."

As you can see...nothing can stop Rotarians when they are on a mission!

April 7th is National Beer Day. This day recognizes the world's most widely consumed alcoholic beverage. Following water and tea, it is the third most popular drink overall. Beer possibly dates back to 9500 BC when cereal was first farmed. It is also recorded in the written history of ancient Iraq and ancient Egypt. In case you are wondering, with 9.8 breweries per 100,000 adults over 21, Oregon is #7 on the list of states with the most craft breweries per capita. Portland Oregon is #2 on the list of US cities with the most breweries (82; Denver has 90 in the #1 spot).

April 15th is National Tax Day. A national income tax was first collected in the United States in 1862 to fund the Civil War. It was deemed unconstitutional due to not being apportioned with conformity across the states. Once again, the United States enacted an income tax with the 16th Amendment in 1913. At that time, the filing deadline was March 1. In 1918 the deadline was changed to March 15, and then in 1955, for the most recent change, the filing deadline was moved to April 15th. The day has come to be known as Tax Day. Following the ratification of the U.S. Constitution, Benjamin Franklin wrote in a letter: "Our new Constitution is now established, everything seems to promise it will be durable; but, in this world, nothing is certain except death and taxes."

April 17th is National Haiku Poetry Day. A poetry day. Seems weird at first but try it. You will be surprised.

April 18th is National Poem in Your Pocket Day. See April 17th.

April 22nd is Earth Day. Each year on April 22nd, Earth Day campaigns around the globe promote ways to keep the Earth healthy and our planet livable. Environment is one of Rotary International's Seven Areas of Focus so every day is Earth Day for Rotarians. Consider joining your Club's Environment Committee and be part of the solution.

April 30th is Stop Food Waste Day! Did you know that 33% of all food produced globally is lost or wasted every year?; that 45% of root crops, fruit and vegetables produced globally is lost or wasted per year?; that \$1,866 is the annual cost of food wasted by the average American family?; that 25% of the food wasted globally could feed all 795 million undernourished people in the world?; or that 8% of all greenhouse gas emissions each year are due to food loss and waste? How to switch to the digital subscription to Rotary Magazine

Tired of having a stuffed mailbox? Want to do something positive for Earth Day (Apr 22nd)? Not much of interest to you in the latest Rotary Magazine you received in that mailbox? Is it getting harder to read that tiny print in the magazine? Feeling a little guilty about the use of paper for your Rotary Magazine instead of reading it online? Is that what's troubling you bunky?

If so, read on! Changing your Rotary Magazine subscription from hard copy to the digital version is easy! You just have to know your Rotary Club name (Rotary Club of Eugene is our official name), your Rotary ID number (more on that below) and where to go (follow this link): Switch my Rotary Magazine subscription to digital!

Clicking the above link will send you to a form page in My Rotary. Simply fill in the form boxes as requested (email, name, address, etc.) and when you get to Club name use the official name as presented above. The next box asks you to fill in your member ID. If you don't know your ID there are three ways to find it listed at the bottom of this article.

Once you have your Member ID, read on:

Type your ID into the form. Next, click the box that says "I elect to receive *Rotary* magazine in digital form

instead of the print edition" (If you don't click this box you will get both the paper copy and the digital copy delivered to you.)

Then click the "I am not a robot" box.

Finally click **Submit** at the bottom of the form.

Boom! You are done and doing your part to reduce waste and save trees so they can continue to pump out oxygen for us all! Way to go!

To find your Member ID:

1) Look at the printed mailing address on your most recent Rotary magazine. Immediately above your printed name there is a nine-digit number preceded and followed by the pound sign (#).

Your member ID is second through the eight numbers (i.e. seven digits long). For example:

If this was printed on my copy of Rotary Magazine:

#073960266# Gerald Whitman Harris 2805 University...

Then my member ID is 7396026 (I made this number up so please don't practice with it - it may be that I guessed someone's real ID).

2) You can also find your member ID by logging into Dacdb, clicking on the **My Data** tab at the top left of the page, and then clicking the yellow **Edit Member** button at the top right of the page. You will find your Member ID listed on the third line of the Member Information box in the top left quarter of the page. While you are in the Edit page you may as well check the entered information and do any corrections/changes you wish to make. Have you retired recently? Changed work or phone number? If you do change anything please remember to hit the **Save** button at the upper right!

Getting the District Newsletter

Where's My Newsletter?

Darn good question, and we thank you for your patience as we transition to a new format along with our new District website. It is the responsibility of District leadership to keep Rotarian's informed of the happenings and important information from Rotary International, our Zone, and our District. We also hope that it will help us connect with one another. We know change can be challenging and appreciate your support. In addition to fostering better connections, there are other good reasons to change the way our newsletter is distributed. Let me explain.



As you know, Rotary has a new Area of Focus, the Environment. It is not just something cool to talk about it's something to inspire us to take a close look at how we can take action. Every little thing we do helps.

Well, believe it or not, sending out over three-thousand email newsletters every week, that not many people open, does have an impact on the environment.

Here are some interesting facts from an article from the BBC:

Perhaps unsurprisingly, the footprint of an email varies dramatically, from 0.3g CO2e for a spam email to 4g (0.14oz) CO2e for a regular email and **50g (1.7oz) CO2e for one with a photo or hefty attachment** [like a newsletter], according to Mike Berners-Lee, a fellow at Lancaster University who researches carbon footprints.

According to estimates by antispam service Cleanfox, the **average user receives 2,850 unwanted emails every year** from subscriptions, which are responsible for 28.5kg (63lbs) CO2e.

If every adult in the UK sent one less "thank you" email, it could save 16,433 tons of carbon a year – the equivalent to taking 3,334 diesel cars off the road.

Choosing to send an SMS text message is perhaps the most environmentally-friendly alternative as a way of staying in touch, because each text generates just 0.014g of CO2e.

Little things do add up.

So what is the impact of the District 5110 Newsletter?

This is just a quick estimate but sending 3,000 email newsletters with images every week for a year generates about 17,196 lb CO2e. **That's enough to drive the family car 11,400 miles** (that's two trips to New York and back).

So, instead of just bugging everyone with an email that gets deleted, we thought it was better to offer our members a bit more control over how they receive District news. If you open and read the newsletter, that's great. Sign-up here and it will get delivered every week. You must opt-in to receive the newsletter.

If you prefer, we have an alternative News Feed we think you'll really like. It's much more environmentally friendly and you have the news right there on your phone or computer. Your news on your time. Check it out.
