Philip Holt Barnhart President-Elect sand regarding the City's recent proposal to close the road to Skinner Butte. The City had set 11:00 pm on Friday, March 21 as the date of closure. Prompted by letters, calls of complaint and strong media attention, including an editorial arguing against closure from Register-Guard (R-G) editor Alton Baker III, at 5:00 pm Friday the City withdrew the closure order "to allow more time for evaluating alternatives" to the closure of the Park's only access road.

The week of March 24 continued with more efforts from opposition groups to stop the closure of the road. On Tuesday March 25, 1997 the R-G reported that Ray Wiley, a member of the Eugene Rotary Club (sic), pledged to the City that "if the road stays open, he will ask the Club to take on major park improvements as an ongoing project. The Club responded to Ray's pledge as it has done for many projects in this community for the past 102 years: The challenge was accepted. Plans were made and approved, Club volunteers stepped up, task lists were draw up, funds were raised by the Club members and allocated, members used their expertise to draw in contractors for donated or reduced fee services, and the restoration of not only the access road but the whole park had begun.

Over the years, the road was repaired, water was brought to the planters, trash removed, invasive blackberries and ivy was killed, the Big E and Big O were repainted dozens of times, stone steps were constructed from the flagpole down to the Big O, a new access trail was built to the Big E, landscaping plants were added, flowers were planted, weeds were weeded everything that needed paint was painted...and painted again, graffiti was removed, trails maintained and more. Year in and year out, rain or shine. This brings us full circle back to April 19 when Club members honored that pledge once again. Rotary doesn't quit: It's part of our DNA.

The United States Department of Agriculture canceled its Commodity Credit Corporation food purchasing program last month. FOOD For Lane County Executive Director Carolyn Stein said it means a loss of about 15% of their inventory (~1.2 million pounds of food), but not across the board.

"It's the kind of primary foods that build meals: meat, eggs, fresh dairy, and produce," she told KLCC. "Those are often the most expensive things to purchase, and they're the hardest to afford for people that are living paycheck to paycheck."



May 1 is National Law Day. Law Day encourages us to reflect the role of law in the foundation of the country and the importance it has on our society. At noon, it is then raised to full-staff for the remainder of the day. 
