News you can use (and other snippets of useless information)

August 14 is National Code Talkers Day. This honors the contributions of the Native Americans who brought their unique abilities to the World War II effort. The day also highlights their impact on U.S. code and the Native American language that made it possible. While code talkers were instrumental during World War II, the United States military used the Native American language in their coded messages before. During World War I, the Choctaw tribe's language was called upon to relate coded messages. Read more at Code Talkers.

August 17 is National Nonprofit Day (NND). This day recognizes the goals and positive impacts nonprofits have on communities and the world. Somewhere a volunteer reads to school children. At the same time, a patient receives steady medication. A lawyer provides legal services for low-income individuals. A lost soul's life is remembered with dignity, thanks to a nonprofit funeral home. Elsewhere, a first-time homebuyer moves into his own home. *Rotary International's The Rotary Foundation (TRF)* provides funds to Rotarians to do projects like these and more all over the world.

August 26 is National Women's Equality Day. The United States Congress passed the 19th Amendment to the Constitution granting women full and equal voting rights on this day in 1920. The wheels for the 19th Amendment were set in motion decades earlier: While in London at the World Anti-Slavery Convention 1840, several women were denied access to the convention floor. This denial of access planted the seeds for a women's rights movement. Lucretia Mott and Elizabeth Cady Staton, along with Martha Wright, Mary Ann McClintock, and Jane Hunt, set in motion plans for the first women's rights convention in Seneca Falls, New York. Held at Wesleyan Chapel on July 19-20, 1848, the conference drew 200 women on the first day. On the second day, the convention opened to men, and some did attend. During the convention, leaders presented 12 resolutions enumerating the rights of women needed to make women equal to men socially, economically, legally and representatively. Of the resolutions, all but the 9th, which enumerated women's right to vote, were approved unanimously. The right to vote created concern. Many women felt it would cause large numbers of their backers to withdraw their support. However, after much debate and the support of abolitionist Frederick Douglass, the 9th resolution also passed. With this action, women's suffrage began in earnest in the United States. Another advocate, Susan B. Anthony, joined Stanton in 1869 to create the National Woman Suffrage Association (NWSA). Through nearly ten years of persistence and lobbying, the NWSA introduced an amendment in 1878. Despite years of debate it was finally brought to the floor of Congress in 1886, only to be defeated. For many years advocates continued their efforts for equal rights. New states entered the union, some of these already had constitutions that codified rights for women that states before them never had - including the right to vote. Civil disobedience ensued and women gained ground in their fight for equality. Finally, Congress passed the 19th Amendment to the Constitution in 1920.

September 1 is Labor Day. Labor Day occurs on the first Monday of every September. This day recognizes the men and women who labor to build this country. Through a time-honored tradition with roots in the coordinated efforts of the labor movement of the 1800s, we salute the American workforce on this day.

On September 5, 1882, <u>Labor Day</u> first honored workers in New York City. The observance later moved to the first Monday in September in 1884. However, the observance wasn't officially recognized by any government entity until 1885 when a New York City municipal ordinance was passed. New York was also the first state to introduce a bill recognizing Labor Day as a state holiday, however, **Oregon** was the first to pass a statewide law recognizing Labor Day on February 21, 1887. In 1894, Congress declared the day to be a national observance and a federal holiday, however, this declaration was politically influenced and seen by President Grover Cleveland as a sop to workers to de-escalate tensions arising from labor unrest and strikes of the mid-1890s, particularly the Pullman Strike of
