TODAY'S PROGRAM

- ❖ Chris Vanden Heuvel has served for 10 years as Healdsburg District Superintendent

Healdsburg schools are in good shape. 150 years of history. Enrollment is up slightly for the first time in years. 65% Latino student population. Average class size in K-5 is 17. Leader in UC acceptances. Healdsburg HS has highest A-G Rate in Sonoma County (64%, Latino 53%). Pandemic learning loss has been closed based on CAASPP scores. School safety is focus with training and anonymous app. (No brandished weapons on campuses for



last 15 years.) Suspension rates are low and run below state level at 2.62%. To support our immigrant families, HUSD is a "safe haven" district. Wellness Center at HHS counsel students experiencing anxiety and crisis issues. (Anxiety levels are still high after Covid.) Finances: funded by property taxes – approximately \$25,000-26,000 per student (state funded average base funding level of \$16,000-17,000). 2024-25 budget expenses \$37.79m (80% towards salaries/employees and benefits). 42% salary raises for staff over the last 5 years. Now the highest paid district for teachers. Inter-district transfers now allowed on a limited basis to maintain classes and opportunities for students in the junior and high schools. Bond Measure R raises \$49m for capital improvement projects at elementary schools. (HES entry, Fitch Mountain School field and HHS Aquatics Center)
