Dr. Bryna Siegel, founder and executive director of the Autism Cener of Northern California. Topic: What is Autism. What Isn't Autism.

Dr. Siegel gave a revealing presentation on this important subject to members, and residents of Rossmoor with firsthand experience of this disorder in their families. She started studying this disorder in the 70's.

She described autism as atypical development. How it emerges. How to identify it. What to do about it. And, how it affects families. How much autism is there? Centers for Disease Control (CDC) says that one in thirty-one people are affected. But she said, this statistic is unhelpful. The DSM

(Diagnostic Statistical Manual) diagnoses of autism are "camels built by a horse community." It was thought that genetics would be the key, but psychiatry has no biomarkers.

She delineated the behaviors of those with autism; social communication difficulties; narrow interests; and repetitive activities.

Autism must be present in early development. It cannot be self-diagnosed. More adults are being diagnosed, and 30 percent have intellectual disabilities. Autism is like the "common cold" with all kinds of manifestations.

In regard to family issues autism is a major stressor, a major life event. For parents psychopathology is at risk. It is normal to have some level of denial. At some point, stasis and chronic sorrow with acceptance occurs.
