PROGRAM

Guest Speaker-Tony P., Distinguished Affiliated Scholar at the Center for the Study of Law & Society, UC Berkeley. Tony describes himself as a "revisionist" historian, one who studies history as an "argument about the past."

Today's historians he said, are primarily writing about what is happening today. As a graduate of Cal, Tony described his love/hate relationship as a student, and faculty member. He went on to detail how Berkeley and

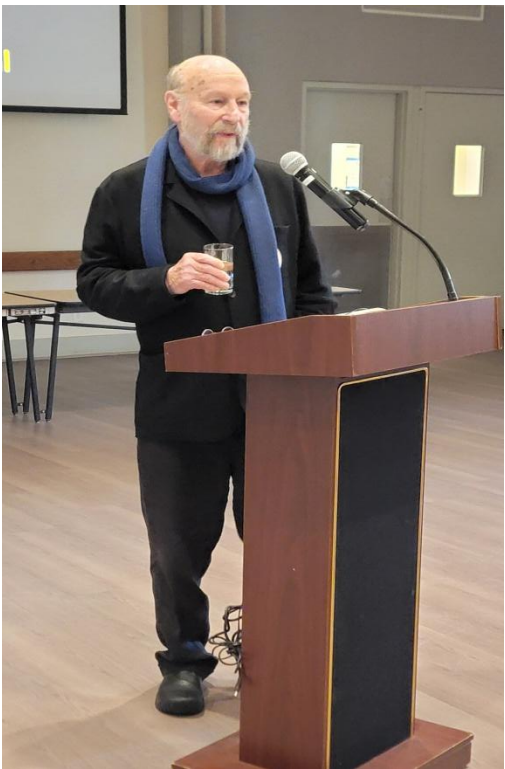
the University are so important to the history of California. He said that the more you learn about Cal, the more ambivalent you become.



In the beginning of the State, Cal-Berkeley was the only university in the state that was tied both militarily, and diplomatically. Cal is independent of the State legislature. It has an endowment of \$190 billion. It is the second largest employer in the State. It has 300,000 students, and 265,000 staff.

The Regents operate in secret refusing to disclose investment strategies; and Berkeley is profoundly conservative, despite what many of us have always thought as progressive and liberal. In his book, “The Scandal of Berkeley,” he tells of Berkeley being the first city in the U.S. to have racial covenants, and segregation. The book goes on to describe how UC Berkeley has created a fantasy narrative and sense of amnesia about its actual history. Yet UC Berkeley as many of us know has a long history of activism, e.g., the

“free speech movement,” the first non-commercial radio station, KPFA, etc. An activist himself, Tony’s work as a founding member of the Berkeley Truth & Justice Project, continues to do research on Cal’s land holdings and investments, and as an advocate for land-back to Tribes and Native American organizations affected by UC Berkeley’s actions over time.
