



### Speaker for the Day - John Rothmann

**Wendy Howard** introduced our speaker, John Rothmann. A former KGO talk show host, he is a lecturer and a professor at the Fromm Institute for Lifelong Learning at the University of San Francisco. He also hosts a podcast called Around the Political World. He worked on Richard Nixon's 1968 presidential campaign and has published articles on American political history, education and the Middle East.

John Rothmann opened his remarks by expressing his support for Rotary and our work with Polio and other vaccinations. He stressed that his views are nonpartisan in keeping with Rotary's values. He opined that this country is divided and is in a constitutional crisis. He believes that the current president and the Supreme Court are engaged in

confrontation. He cited other divisive Supreme Court decisions, including Brown vs. the Board of Education, Roe vs. Wade and Bush vs. Gore, noting that Al Gore said he may not agree with the decision, but the Supreme Court is the law of the land. There is a question as to whether the current president will comply with the decisions of the Supreme Court.

He discussed President Richard Nixon complying with providing the tapes relating to Watergate when told to by the Supreme Court.

Like Leon Panetta, who spoke to our club a few weeks ago, he emphasized that this country is not governed by executive order or a king. The current president has currently defied judicial deportation decisions. Rothmann noted that he was initially a Republican but is now a Democrat. He thinks there is a way forward if Democrats focus on the issues and hold a press conference every week. There was a time in America when people could civilly disagree. Wendell Wilkie referred to himself as the loyal opposition. It is problematic when politicians have a lust for power and are bent on revenge and retribution. His solution is to be informed and listen to everything, vote, be involved in communities and teach the essence of civics and listen to people who hold opposing viewpoints because that is the only way you can have a discussion.

Mr. Rothmann received a standing ovation. **President Shannon** thanked our speaker and told him that a donation in his name would be made to Polio Plus.
