THIS WEEK'S SPEAKER CHRISTINA O'CONNELL "RESTORING THE BLUE BOY"

Introducer: PP Mary Lou Byrne



Christina Milton O'Connell is the Mary Ann and John Sturgeon Senior Paintings Conservator at The Huntington Library, Art Museum, and Botanical Gardens.

O'Connell began at The Huntington in 2013 as the first paintings conservator on staff. Her initial projects included establishing a lab space at the Huntington for the examination and treatment of paintings as well as a condition survey of all the Art Collections (over 40,000 collection items, 600 of which were paintings).

Starting in 2017, O'Connell planned and managed the multi-year treatment and technical study of Gainsborough's *The Blue Boy*, with many of the conservation treatment steps carried out in the gallery for visitors to observe.

O'Connell previously worked as a painting conservator at the Indianapolis Museum of Art from 2004-2013. O'Connell has also held

positions at The National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C., the Rijksmuseum in Amsterdam, and the M.H. DeYoung Museum in Sann Francisco. O'Connell graduated from the Winterthur/University of Delaware Program in Art Conservation in 2004.

We appreciate your understanding and cooperation in helping one another.




Justene Adamec 626-806-2529

She then led us all in singing "You're a Grand Old Flag," followed by the pledge of allegiance. **Sally de Leon** (photo right) gave the inspiration – it was her first time and she did a great job!



President Justene went right to the introduction of guests, of which there were many.**Bob Risley**, **Howard Raff**, and **Dean Billman** all had guests, and Michael Desplaines, the new CEO of the L.A. County Arboretum, was making one last guest appearance before being inducted into our club next week. In addition, our speaker, Judge Meltzer, brought his mom as his special guest. Marilyn Diaz, past president of Sierra Madre Rotary was also in attendance.



We remained standing and **Bob Risley** delivered the sad news that **Past President John Cushman** passed away last week. John was a life-long Pasadenean who was deeply involved in many aspects of the community. He is survived by his wife Ginny, three children, six grandchildren, and eight great-grandchildren. **President Justene** played a short video featuring John's reminiscences of his time as president of our club. He began by saying how lucky he was to see so much change in his life, and concluded by saying, "The only thing that doesn't change is service above self." We had a moment of silence in John's honor.

Next up, **Past President Cathy Simms** (photo right) shared the very exciting news that our ongoing Global Grants project, Caring Little Hearts, has reached that amazing milestone of five hundred lifesaving pediatric heart surgeries performed! This project was started by **Past President Shel Capeloto** in his presidential year of 2017-2018, and was our club's first Global Grant, in partnership with the Rotary Club of Madras South in



Chennai, India (which became our sister Rotary Club in 2018-2019). Reap, Cambodia, updated everybody on Community First Initiatives, the nonprofit he runs which has done several successful projects with Pasadena Rotary and District 5300. After announcements (see below for upcoming events), **President Justene** introduced **Dean Billman**, who is the Polio Plus Chair for District 5300. Dean, in turn, introduced a very special guest, our District Governor Michael Soden, who was in attendance with his wife Sylvia. Michael shared that the reason he joined Rotary is because of our polio eradication efforts – it's very near and dear to his heart because Sylvia is a polio survivor. Because he is so

passionate about polio, he has created the Polio Plus Society in our district. For a donation of only \$100, you can become a member! **President Justene** announced the names of several people in our Club who are members already, and D.G. Michael handed out large shiny Polio Plus Society challenge coins to those people. **Justene** then asked several other people if they would join, and they all said yes and were given coins. At that point, people got so excited about the whole thing that Justene just said "Okay, stand up if you want to donate," and Michael ran all around the room giving out coins, and there was general chaos and it was pretty great! Past President Mary Lou Byrne introduced our speaker, Judge Abraham Meltzer of the Pasadena Superior Court. Mary Lou has known Judge Meltzer for many years, and shared that when she was a partner in a law firm in Downtown Los Angeles, Judge Meltzer was "the smartest associate we ever had!" And fun fact: Judge Meltzer won the Rotary Four-Way Test speech contest at Beaumont High School in 1984 (and judged our Four Way Test Contest last year)!

Judge Meltzer worked for many years as Chief of the Civil Fraud Section of the U.S. Attorney's Office, and he told us that fraud is "part of the human condition." What is fraud? "It's when you use words to make something unreal appear to be real."



PP Mary Lou wasn't kidding when she said Judge Meltzer was smart -- In addition to being a prominent judge and legal scholar, Judge Meltzer is an art lover and philosopher, and he illustrated his presentation with classical art and quotes from famous philosophers. For example, he quoted Friedrich Nietzsche, who said "The art of dissimulation reaches its peak in man. . . The liar uses the valid designations, the words, in order to make something which is unreal appear to be real. He says 'I am rich,' when the proper designation for his condition would be 'poor.'" Then showed us a

pretty gruesome 19th-century etching illustrating Dante's placement of the fraudulent lower in Hell



than the violent, because they have misused their minds, which separate humans from animals. Whew!

Again, what is fraud? "A simulacrum passed off as reality." What is hyperreality? It is confusing a symbol with being the thing it supposedly symbolizes.

Some examples of hyperreality:

A driver's license. Judge Meltzer posited that in some ways, "our photo ID is more real than we are. You know who you are, but try getting on an airplane without your ID!"

Grades in school are more real than the knowledge they supposedly represent. "My wife is a professor at USC Law School, and if she asked her students

whether they'd rather have complete mastery of the material with a C grade, or 50% mastery with an A grade, they would all choose the latter!"

There are, said Judge Meltzer, levels of fraud. Level One is a simulation of an existing thing. For example, a fake Rolex watch vs. a real Rolex. (Pro tip, per the judge, one clue to a real Rolex is a large date magnifier window!)

Level Two fraud is a simulation of something that does not exist; a simulacrum. Judge Meltzer told us an interesting story about an artist who painted a picture and claimed it was a "lost" painting by Johannes Vermeer. It was purchased by the Rembrandt Society in 1937 for the equivalent of \$5.4 million in today's dollars.

Similarly, in a 2017 federal fraud case called U.S. v. Triple Canopy, Inc., a security company contracted with the government to provide security guards who were required to meet marksmanship qualifications. None of them could pass the marksmanship tests, so the company faked the results. And amazingly and infuriatingly, the whistleblower's supervisor told him to falsely submit higher fake scores for the male guards than for the female guards, on the theory that would be more believable!!

After analyzing the many levels of hyperreality in Andy Warhol's painting Shot Sage Blue Marilyn, (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Shot_Marilyns), we had a very interesting and lively Q and A. President Justene rang the bell to adjourn right on time at 1:30.
