
The speaker has to be utterly charming and know their topic. They don't need a particular viewpoint. They could, for example, be completely against reviving a mammoth.

In memory of the time Frank brought and shared a bottle of Irish whiskey at a Pasadena Rotary meeting during his presidency, Frank donated a bottle of Jameson Irish whiskey to "the newest member of Tyros present at today's meeting." Well, that was obviously Michael Desplaines, who had been inducted moments before! Finally, Phil extended a \$30 polio pig donation and congratulations to Lynne Sullivan on her recent wedding.



Fun fact: **President Justene** and **Don Andrues** were both inducted on the day **PP Frank** brought Irish whiskey to the meeting and, she said, "it's been down hill ever since!"

Done in a Day Co-Chair **Stephen Smith** and **Lisa Kroese** recapped last Saturday's successful Done in a Day project at Don Benito School, at which Rotarians and Don Benito parents cleared planting beds and planted trees and plants. **Lisa** quipped that her big lesson from the day was "Rotarians are more obedient than parent volunteers!"

Tammy Silver recapped last Friday night's Rotary Roamers outing to the Mt. Baldy ski lift and Top of the Notch restaurant. A good time was had by all!

PP Mary Lou Byrne introduced our speaker, Christina O'Connell of the Huntington Library, Art Museum, and Botanical Gardens. Christina is the Mary Ann and John Sturgeon Senior Paintings Conservator at the Huntington, and she single-handedly restored Thomas Gainsborough's The Blue Boy, beginning in 2017.

Christina began with a bit of surprising news: Although the Blue Boy's subject was long thought to be a portrait





of one Jonathan Buttall, the son of a wealthy merchant, the new theory is that the real subject was Gainsborough's nephew, Gainsborough Dupont! Either way, the painting was first exhibited in 1770 in the Royal Academy in London, in only the second year of the Academy's existence.

California railroad magnate Henry Huntington purchased the painting in 1921, which created quite a stir because the Blue Boy had been widely exhibited in England and was very very famous! The people in England were not happy to see their treasure shipped off to California. After its restoration, the painting was returned to London for a visit to the National Gallery

at the National Gallery.

last year, on the 100th anniversary of its last exhibition

When Christina was hired at the Huntington, she examined all the paintings and determined the Blue Boy was a priority because there was a significant amount of flaking paint, and also cracks and splits in the wood stretcher bars.

She used various imaging techniques to analyze the condition of the painting:

- Ultraviolet light showed layers of old varnish, and where restorers had "overpainted."
- X-rays showed there had originally been a dog next to the boy, but Gainsborough decided to cover it up before the painting was completed. X-rays also showed the canvas had been used before, for a different portrait, and revealed a tear in the canvas that is estimated to be 200 years old.
- Infrared reflectology revealed how Gainsborough used dark paint to cover the old portrait before beginning the new portrait.

Christina explained that "from the early stages we knew we wanted to share this process with our visitors, so we established a satellite conservation space in the gallery" where visitors could observe the work being done. Christina also gave regular "gallery talks" and took questions from visitors.

Christina left a lot of time for questions, which was good because the audience was bursting with them! The meeting adjourned at 1:30 and everyone filed out happy and a little more educated than when it began.




