### **DANNY FELDMAN**

"Taking a Victory Lap: Why Theatre Can Change the World"

**Introducer: PP Scott Vandrick** 



Danny Feldman joined Pasadena Playhouse in 2016. Overseeing both the artistic and business operations of the organization, he has worked to stabilize operations while ensuring the highest quality productions. His first season of programming, including Our Town, King Charles III, Pirates of Penzance, Belleville and Bordertown Now was lauded by audience members and critics alike, receiving the company's first Ovation nomination for Best Season.

Prior to the Playhouse, Feldman was Executive Director at Labyrinth Theater in New York City, where he oversaw the

company's first Broadway production, instituted an audience development plan that doubled the audience, and increased contributed income to resolve the organization's long-standing debt. As Managing Director at Reprise Theatre Company, he increased artistic programming, created a city-wide festival, launched a concert series featuring lesser-known Broadway musicals, and created education program, giving at-risk high school students an introduction to classic American musicals.

Under Feldman's leadership, the Pasadena Playhouse was recently awarded the 2023 Regional Theatre Tony Award. "We are thrilled to present the 2023 Regional Theatre Tony Award to Pasadena Playhouse," said Heather Hitchens, President and CEO of the American Theatre Wing and Charlotte St. Martin, President of The Broadway League. "Pasadena Playhouse has made a significant impact – on both a local and global level, by developing some of the most innovative and inspiring works and artists."

Big news: The Holiday Party will be on Wednesday, December 6, in the evening at the Altadena Town and Country Club. There will be no lunch meeting that day.



**PP Mary Lou** introduced our speaker. Larry Livingston is the chair of the conducting department at the USC Thornton School of Music. He lives in Altadena, so he was right at home in our venue.

Larry started by showing us some pictures of early conductors and shared a fun fact: The conductor's baton is a shrunk-down version of a violin bow because early conductors often were the violinists. More fun facts: Beethoven was deaf but insisted on conducting anyway, even though he couldn't stay on the beat. So the orchestra watched the concertmaster instead.

Verdi conducted facing the stage with his back to the orchestra. Over time that's changed and conductors now face the orchestra.

What do you think the conductor is doing? Larry asked. Using the Socratic method, he elicited the following:

- The conductor keeps time ("But all great orchestras respond after the beat.")
- The conductor raises and lowers the dynamics (loudness and softness). Fun fact: According to Larry, pop music has no dynamic change.
- The conductor does "cuing" (telling each instrument when to come in) because the musician's score (the sheet music) only shows their instrument's part and not the whole.
- Finally, "audiences come to concerts and listen with their ears and their eyes." The conductor uses his/her hands, arms, and body to illuminate what makes the music interesting. "You should do the pre-concert talk *during* the concert."

"You need to know the score," said Larry. "Ideally, you could write it from memory." He conducts without the score and says there are two kinds of conductors: Those with the score in their head, and those with their head in the score!

As far as working with musicians, Larry says "It's easy – you have to know exactly what you want, and then you get it!" The rehearsal, he said, "is where you massage the reality." In the old days, conductors were tyrants. These days, the conductor must assuage, encourage, and inspire – more psychologist than tyrant.



Conductors also have to be linguists – scores are written in Italian, French, German, and increasingly in English. You need to be able to read it in any language – Italian is the most common. Larry shared a funny anecdote when he was trying to show off his German skills in Germany and said "breastfeeding" when he meant to say "quiet!"

And with all that in mind, it was time for us to give it a try! Larry showed us a few of his batons, including one his son made from a stick found in the woods when he was seven, and another that same son made on the occasion of his recent marriage. He passes out chopsticks for us to use, and showed us how to hold them. He taught us how to count in 3 /4, 2/4, and 4/4 time, and then played some music and let us have at it, walking around the room and coaching us as we

went.

The result? "I think you should all become electricians because you're all natural conductors!"

We were all having so much fun that we barely noticed that 1:30 had come and gone. Alas, it was time to go but a very very fine time was had by all!
