APRIL 16 MEETING RECAP: TITAN BIZ PRESENTATIONS

For the 15th year in a row, Titan Business and Finance teacher Courtney Rushing brought her top business plan teams to compete for prize money in front of our club. These four teams were previously selected by their classmates as the best business plans.

First place winner (\$300) **BUILD YOUR OWN FIT** is a convertible clothing brand using recyclable materials to support sustainable fashion. Imagine short pants that can convert to long pants. The company targets females 15-25 years old with products designed to be sold on-line and promoted on social media. Their slogan is "saving the environment, one fit at a time."

Second place (\$200) **FLOW FREE** is a menstrual product that replaces plastic components with softer, natural materials that are more breathable and eco-friendlier. This affordable premium product will be sold online and possibly offer a subscription model.

Third place (\$150) **CRAY ENERGY** offers cramp-relief gummies to help teen and adult athletes 14-25 years old recover from leg cramps. Utilizing acetic acid as their active ingredient, they plan to compete with Pickle Juice and Pickle Pops which "taste bad and utilize wasteful packaging." Cray Energy gummies are more convenient and fast acting. They will be sourced from supplement co-packers and marketed to athletes and trainers via e-commerce and gas stations.

Fourth place (\$100) **SECOND SPIN** is about fashion in motion. They offer wearable bracelets to preserve athletic memories. The bracelets are made from discarded sports equipment and are aimed at 16-18 year old girls who are active, social and sporty. Each bracelet costs \$2.10 to make and will sell for \$12.50. APRIL 23 PROGRAM: Elise Barclay: O'Melveny & Meyers Art Collection

Elise Barclay is curator of the O'Melveny & Myers Art Collection, a position she has held since 2007. She brings a strong background in art history and museum education to her role. Her previous experience also includes positions at the San Francisco Museum of Modern Art, the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, and the Williams College Art Museum. Elise holds a B.A. in Art History from the University of California, Berkeley, and an M.A. from the Williams College Graduate Program in the History of Art.

Elise will present an overview of the O'Melveny & Myers Art Collection, established in 1969 and now comprising more than 3,000 works. She will trace the collection's development over the past five decades, highlighting key acquisitions and curatorial decisions that have shaped its direction. Additionally, Elise will place the O'Melveny Collection in the broader context of corporate art collections, discussing the role such collections play in the workplace and their significance within the corporate sector.
