NOV 2 PROGRAM RECAP

Megan Duncan, Disney Imagineer, "Imagine Tomorrow"

Southern California is home to the Disney company, which now has theme parks, cruise ships and film production and distribution worldwide. All these projects tell a story and one of the elements crucial to telling the story is the audio. Our speaker, Meagan Duncan (daughter of Qing and Kyle Duncan) works as an imagineer in the audio department of Disney in Glendale. She recently returned from a worldwide trip that took her to Shanghai and Tokyo (where Disney has theme parks) and to one of the company's cruise ships. All these locations need sound to tell the story. Some of these projects, such as theme park attractions, are so complicated that they can take five years to complete. They also need to translate some aspects into foreign languages. Meagan has Mandarin language skills which help her collaborate with Disney representatives in Shanghai. Her own journey started as a Performance Major with an interest in youth theater. But then she became interested in sound mixing and editing and pursued education in this field at Emerson College in Boston before landing her dream job at Disney. Sounds good to me.

witnessed first hand.

Caroline Yu, from the Foundation Committee, explained how our club gets Districted Dedicated Funds (DDF) for our projects. Basically, 25% of all the money we donate to Rotary International through our district can come back to our club for use on our projects. Since our club donated approximately \$34,000 last year, we received back \$8500, which we are using for the Corazon house build in Mexico (\$3500), the Rise Against Hunger (\$1,000), and Rotary Readers (\$4,000).

Banner Exchange was executed flawlessly.

Former District Governor (District 5240; Year 2021-2022) Dana Moldovan visited as a guest of Mara Chindris. Dana is the person who encouraged Mara to join our club. She brought along a banner from her club of Westlake Village and a "banner exchange" was made. The banner exchange reminds us that we are linked to a worldwide organization with genuine human connections. Rotary is indeed a big club and, guess what, you're in it!

ROTARY BEHIND THE SCENES Teen Leadership Conference (TLC) Debbie Priester

Debbie Priester has been busy lately getting students selected and prepared to attend the 3-day Teen Leadership Conference in Running Springs. Debbie was instrumental in creating this program for the district 20 years ago and she is still managing our club's participation. It's "her baby." In

fact, she took charge of the program at the district level when she was pregnant with her baby boy. As her son grew up, so did the TLC program to become one of the district's signature programs. Whereas RYLA sends high school leaders to camp for a week, TLC sends 8th graders to camp for a weekend where they are exposed to inspirational lecturers and participate in leadership training exercises. To select the ten or so students we send each year from our club, Debbie must interview about 35 students, which takes about 4 or 5 full days because she is required to work around core subjects. The students must fill out an application which includes their volunteer experience and philosophy of service. The application and interview process itself is a benefit to all the students, even those not selected. It's a lot of work for Debbie, but she loves it. She found her labor of love in Rotary. You will be able to hear from the TLC kids at the Dec. 7 luncheon meeting, just after they return from their camp experience. These kids are not only confident and articulate, but also genuinely funny. You won't want to miss the Dec. 7 program.
