### Your Donor History of Giving to The Rotary Foundation

Did you know that when you log into <u>rotary.org</u> and arrive at the landing page, you are greeted with a "Hello" (and your name) just above six very important boxes where all kinds of information can be found? One thing that gets overlooked is on this same page on the top right corner. There is a "My Account" with a drop-down arrow. If you click that, you will see five choices. One of them is titled "My Donations". There, you will be able to see a summary page of the total amount that you (and jointly with a spouse/partner) have given over the years. After that review, there is another tab at the bottom of the page that allows you to see each individual transaction of contributions and foundation points (both in and out). If you cannot find this information, you can always call me or the Rotary Support Call Center. You will be walked through how to locate the information.

Through the first 10 weeks of the Rotary year, about 26% of our district members have made contributions to the Rotary Foundation. This includes to the Annual Fund-SHARE, Annual Fund - others, Polio Plus Fund and the Endowment. In an average year, about 60% of our members contribute to the Rotary Foundation. All Club Presidents are aware (but maybe not all club members) that our District Governor Michael and his wife Sylvia are talking during their club visits about the giving to the Polio Plus Fund. Members who sign up (commit) and contribute at least \$100 annually to the Polio Plus Fund for at least 3 years will become members of the Polio Plus Society and receive special recognition. #### In Just One Week for LV After Hours

**Baby's Bounty** morning diaper distribution resulted in 26 service hours of packing and distributing diapers and wipes to 741 families - a record! This meant that the families will be able to take their babies to daycare, so the parents/caregivers can go to work.

**Spread the Word Nevada** resulted in 28 hours of cleaning eleven cases of gently used children's books to be distributed to local Clark County elementary school kids as forever books. It continues to be a Club favorite, as it allows us to break bread together and have fun looking for the craziest titles! 500 "new" books - 500 opportunities for children and families to improve their reading skills.

**The Just One Project** provides ongoing distributions of food to families facing food insecurity. It was another great opportunity for us to earn 21 hours of service packing food into cars for 200 families on a cool Saturday morning, along with volunteers from our local university and businesses.

**Agassi Boys & Girls Club.** Birthday Hour garnered 16 hours of service providing eleven kids with a special party to celebrate their August and September birthdays. Pizza and cupcakes are always a hit, but the games the kids get to play take it over the top. The presence of new Club members brings in fresh, new ideas and our new member LaRae Sloan suggested the Jenga game. Even the "cool" high school kids couldn't resist joining in the fun.

All of these opportunities align with our commitment to local kids and families, and give our volunteers such a feeling of goodwill and joy. The bigger picture for us is the gratitude and feelings of inclusion that we gave everyone. Maybe the most heartwarming story was of a young boy who was hanging out outside the birthday room at Agassi, not wanting to come in to celebrate his birthday. We offered to bring him goodies outside the room, or set him up in a quiet corner of the room, eventually convincing him to come inside, where he quickly made at least one new friend who also liked football. He ended up having a blast as evidenced by his huge smile. This young man was hearing impaired, with double hearing aids. A small act of kindness with a big result. Rotary!!

### **West Covina Thanksgiving Baskets**

The Rotary Club of West Covina will prepare Thanksgiving Dinner Baskets for 95 low-

income families on Wednesday, November 22nd (day before Thanksgiving) at the regular meeting time. Each member will bring items to contribute, and after a quick lunch will put the baskets for dinner (and more) together. With the assistance of Foothill Transit and members with vans, baskets will be transported to East Valley, where staff will help unload and distribute the baskets to the selected families from 2:00 – 6:00 pm.

Members are provided a list of items needed for the baskets. They can choose to bring all 95 items in any category, or share the load with a fellow Rotarian. Alicia will be updating and sharing the signup list on a weekly basis. The Club also requests contributions and/or discounts from retailers in the community.

The Club has been sponsoring the Thanksgiving basket project for almost 30 years, starting with 15 baskets and, as years passed, growing to the current 95. The families are selected from among patients of East Valley Community Health Center who would not otherwise have a family Thanksgiving dinner. High inflation has disproportionally impacted low-income families, their struggle to pay for basic necessities makes it almost impossible to afford a special Thanksgiving meal. They also look at their ability to be able to cook the turkey (some families don't have access to an oven). East Valley also connects with local elected officials for turkey contributions.

This project will signal to the selected families that they are not alone and their community cares about their well-being.
