That means that on a specific date (within the last 15 years), all of the Active Club Members achieved Paul Harris Fellow level in giving to the Rotary Foundation and received a special Rotary lapel pin. If you are a club officer and are not aware if your club is one of the 24, please reach out to your Assistant Governor or contact me and I will give you an update.

Since July, 41 clubs (just over 70%) have contributed to the Annual Fund of the Rotary Foundation. Many clubs have already exceeded their established goals. Keep up the good work. As you are aware, giving to the Annual Fund or Polio Plus is very easy: give through 1) Rotary Direct or 2) go to http://www.rotary.org and locate the DONATE button, or (3) you can give with your dues through your club.

Some other district statistics so far in DG Michael Soden's year include:

- 9 new Major Donors at different levels
- 3 Major Gifts (a one-time contribution of at least \$10,000)
- 68 Paul Harris Society Members (pledge \$1,000 annually to Foundation)

### A story of dedication and gratitude

Submitted by Karen Lujan, Monrovia Rotary in Memory of Dr. BaickDr. Choong Hyun Baick was born in Osaka, Japan on August 21, 1936, the son of a Korean doctor and his wife who were living in the Korean community in Japan. He survived World War II and the Korean War, then came to Los Angeles as a college student in 1956, determined to get the best medical education in the world.

During his first year in America, Dr. Baick gave a speech to the Monrovia Rotary Club about why he came to the United States and what his ambitions were. The Rotarians were so impressed by Dr. Baickâ€<sup>™</sup>s speech that they decided to sponsor his education with a full scholarship to college and medical school. Most of the financial support came from one specific Rotary club member, Dr. Delos Comstock. All of Dr. Baickâ€<sup>™</sup>s educational expenses were covered by the scholarship, and to earn personal spending money he worked as a fruit picker in the San Joaquin Valley, and a bus boy at a Beverly Hills restaurant. **Dr. Baick later gave over \$100,000 to establish a scholarship in honor of Dr. Comstock, administered by the Monrovia Rotary Club.** Dr. Baick also created scholarships for the Santa Ana and Tustin Rotary Clubs (now merged).

### **Pasadena Rotary Walk to End Polio**
