Dr. Katherine Hayhoe, Distinguished Professor from Texas Tech gave us a very easy to follow lesson on how we can protect our environment. She encouraged us to take action in every small way we can in our communities to impact our environment: "Hope isn't wishful thinking but rather what gives us the courage to act". She said it is never too late to get started – "The goal of the conversation is not to tell people about climate change, it's to expand the number of people in the conversation." Hence this coming year, we are partnering with District 5330 to champion protecting our environment. The House of Friendship was bustling with creativity. An impressive display was the Three-Year Action Plan sharing four ways we can impact our communities: Expand Our Reach, Increase Our Impact, Enhance Participant Engagement, Increase Our Ability to Adapt. Seven areas were designated for each of the areas of service. My personal favorite was the Peace Park, co-organized by our PDG Chehab El-Awar and his wife Bricia from District 5330. The Peace Park was a large area dedicated to many activities related to peace, from footsteps that showed the history of how far we've come in achieving peace through our projects to a large heading showcasing the words of top leaders who fought for peace such as this quote from Desmond Tutu: "If you want peace, you do not talk to your friends, you talk to your enemies". There were many hands-on activities facilitated by local Rotaract and Interact members.

Another favorite was the **Polio Virtual Reality** booth with photos surrounding the walls of the booth showing the history of our End Polio Campaign and how far we've come since the mid 80's when the project was adopted. We got word from Bill Gates and the Gates Foundation that they will



continue their commitment to Rotary for a \$300M 2 to 1 match to eradicate polio over the next three years. As the Calgarians say when they want to exclaim good news: "Yahoo"!

My Governor classmates and I were eager to meet our newly named RI President Elect, Francesco Arezzo, from Ragusa, Italy. While we have had 21/2 years to prepare for our Governorships, he had only two weeks to prepare for the coming year. He asked for our affection and support. He is excited to expand on the slogan of Unite for Good. Even in its simplicity, he said the theme has a far reach into everything we do as Rotarians: "uniting in service, uniting in our collaborations with our community to further our impact, uniting to build bridges and work in harmony with as many individuals as possible." Unite over time to span the next 3-5 years with your leadership team so that we can plan bigger multi-year projects. Francesco's three goals are to 1) Grow membership, 2) Eradicate polio for good and 3) Peace. For Francesco, Peace is what we do best and we have been doing it every day: sending a young person to one of our peace centers; sending students through our Youth Exchange program to study abroad; and preventing and curing disease is working for peace. Providing clean drinking water or sanitation is working for peace. Giving women the opportunity to give birth in a safe environment is working for peace. All our seven areas of focus are peace building initiatives that we have been working on for more than a century. He said, "Dreaming is indispensable. A poet of the last century said that you begin to die the very moment you stop dreaming. Never stop dreaming. Dreaming is not enough. We have to act. We are People of Action."

Next year's convention will be in Taipei, Taiwan from June 13 – 17th. I am registered to attend and hope you will consider attending too. Enjoy the few photos from the convention.

Las Vegas Rotary and WestCare Nevada Empower Job Seekers through Second Annual Suit Drive

Southern Nevada locals working to rebuild their lives are now one step closer to employment after a local suit drive provided professional clothing, support and a renewed sense of purpose.

The Las Vegas Rotary Club, in partnership with WestCare Nevada, a nonprofit and one of its corporate members, outfitted 40 people with suits donated by club members in preparation for job interviews. WestCare Nevada provides behavioral health services and re-entry support for individuals facing substance use, mental health challenges and involvement in the criminal justice system.

"As a result, 21 of the 40 individuals who received suits have already secured new jobs," said Leo Magrdichian, a Las Vegas Rotarian and regional vice president of WestCare Nevada. "We've heard directly from recipients that this drive truly boosts their confidence—it helps them stand a little taller.... Some shared that they sent photos to their parents, felt a sense of pride and even said it made them feel like an adult for the first time. Moments like these are why we continue this work."

Volunteers provide handwritten notes of encouragement with each outfit, creating meaningful moments of hope and connection.

"This suit drive represents the best of what happens when community partners come together," said Andrew Moran, a Las Vegas Rotarian and development director for WestCare Nevada. "Each suit, along with a handwritten note of encouragement, offers more than a fresh start — it offers hope. It's a true example of Rotary's values in action: dignity, opportunity and service to others."

The Las Vegas Rotary Club is committed to service projects that create long-term impact. The suit drive reflects Rotary's core values of dignity, opportunity and community—one individual, one job and one suit at a time.







LV After Hours - Serving Families in California and Mexico!

A site visit to the school showed firsthand the incredible impact of our efforts, with equipment already in use and 8th graders assembling rolling computer stands for their teachers. We also delivered one of two office copiers, generously donated by Renato Ritter, along with 150 new stuffed animals donated by Summerlin Rotarian Michael Turner.

And while managing this grant, PP Linda Bertuzzi and Prez Cat Brame found time to create two beautiful quilts for the Super Build family in Mexico. The "Home is Where the Heart Is" quilt colors represented Rotary, the hearts paid tribute to our partnership with Corazon and our "Rotary Club with the Biggest Heart" and, finally, the yellow doors reflected light and happiness. The 12-year-old niece's love of Legos inspired the second bright and playful quilt, which brought a huge smile to her face when she received it. And thanks to members Barbara Dempsey and Eugene Maresh for personally delivering them when they went down to help build!

Taste of South Pasadena Becomes a Force for Recovery

In January 2025, the Eaton Fire devastated the Altadena foothills, displacing hundreds of families - including many fellow Rotarians from across District 5300. In response, the Rotary Club of South Pasadena transformed its 11th Annual Taste of South Pasadena from a joyful community celebration into a meaningful act of service.

Proceeds from the event launched the Eaton Fire Relief Grant Program, offering up to \$2,000 to individuals, families, and small businesses who lost their homes - prioritizing applicants employed in South Pasadena. While insurance may cover physical losses, these grants aim to restore the irreplaceable: heirlooms, tools, books, and personal treasures that bring comfort and identity. Almost 1000 fire survivors applied. Recipients will be notified by the end of summer 2025.

At Rotary, compassion is action. This grant is our way of
