After two years, I then served under DRFCC Susan Johnson as the Annual Fund Sub-Chair before beginning my current position on July 1, 2021.

An item recently showed up in my inbox - an invitation from the Network of

California Community College Foundations via Zoom. They are awarding The Rotary Foundation and the Rotary Clubs of California the *Bernard Osher Philanthropist of the Year Award* on **April 3, 2024**. The Rotary Foundation and the Rotary Clubs of California are honored for their generous contributions that have provided invaluable support in the form of student



scholarships, funding for college programs, and active engagement through volunteering initiatives on campuses statewide. Rotary International Director Dan Himelspach will represent us along with District Governor Marta G. Brown from District 5240.

My own Altadena Rotary Club has provided more than \$10,000 in Vocational and Veteran Scholarships in each of the last 15 years. We actually started awarding Vocational Scholarships at Pasadena City College in the early 1960s. Many of our Clubs have such contributions to be proud of!

Welcome Home District 5300 Rotaplast Team!

Volunteers from District 5300 recently returned from an extraordinary two-week cleft lip and palate surgery mission in Cebu City, Philippines. Bonita Ramos, Richard Ramos, Rae Kearney, Linda Bertuzzi, Soren Jarabelo, Terry Pickens, Vicky Abbott and Daryl Beans joined the 26 member team in San Francisco on February 24th, and departed with nearly one ton of medical supplies, from gauze to anesthesia equipment. From the time the team arrived at Adventist Hospital, they were fully immersed in organizing the medical records area, PACU, pediatrics, and the operating rooms. After screening just over 100 families, some of whom had come from miles and hours away, the patients, from babies to 14-year-olds, were selected and the procedures scheduled.

After seven full days of surgeries by some of the nation's finest plastic surgeons, assisted by a highly experienced nursing team, 69 children received life-changing surgeries to improve their chances for a brighter future. The success of this mission was made possible by remarkable support of a cleft lip and palate fund established within District 5300, along with Cebu Port Centre Rotary, Abounding in Love (a US charity that helps provide free cleft lip and palate surgery for poor children in the Philippines), and, of course, Rotaplast. As one parent wrote in her thank you - $\hat{a} \in \mathbb{C}$ Thank you for everything and for the wonderful and successful surgery to my son. We are so happy that now our son is free from bullying and discrimination. May God bless you for your kind hearts." Saving Smiles. Changing Lives!

Altadena Club Celebrates 75th Anniversary

On Saturday, February 10th, our club celebrated 75 years of service. We were chartered on Valentine's Day, 1949. District Governor Michael Soden and his wife attended our Celebration Dinner, and shared the importance of all Rotary Clubs making a difference. With more than 120 in attendance (the majority being local community members supporting our club), the club raised \$11,000 that will be



used to create two additional Annual Scholarships for Pasadena City College. These two scholarships will be specific for those receiving a CTE in Library Technology.

Also in February, our club used funds from The Rotary Foundation (DDF dollars) to help our local Friends of the Altadena Library at their sale of used books. In March, we again used funding from The Rotary Foundation to support our "Reading To Children" program at Families Forward Learning Center. At that event, we provided supplies for children under 5, club members read to the children, and we made a contribution to their pre-school programs.



Greater Chino Hills: LIFELINE Global Grant

The Global Grant application (GG2454374 LIFELINE) for funding to provide an ambulance to General Trias Medicare Hospital in the Philippines, submitted by the Rotary Club of Cavite Centro (Host) and the Rotary Club of Greater Chino Hills (International Partner), was recently approved by The Rotary Foundation.

The Lifeline Global Grant is a humanitarian project that will provide an ambulance to General Trias Medicare Hospital in Cavite, Philippines. The total



population of General Trias City is 450,583 to date. This hospital has only one ambulance serving the people in the city and cannot meet the demand for emergency and urgent patient care response. There is an urgent need for an additional ambulance for this hospital.

The total award is in the amount of \$36,112. The grant has a generous endowment gift of \$15,000 from the Herminio Esguerra and Joyce Michelle Socorro Loyola Ambrary Disease Prevention and Treatment Directed Gift. The grant is funded by District Designated Funds from Rotary Districts 3810 and 5300; cash contributions from the Rotary Clubs of Cavite Centro, Cavite Uptown, Chinatown-Manila and Greater Chino Hills; and the World Fund.

LasVegas - Hydroponics Project

The Las Vegas Rotary Club donated \$10,000 to Green Our Planet's "Hydro Connect†program to install a hydroponics program at Kermit R. Booker Elementary School. Hydro Connect is designed to encourage STEM education nationwide and to connect students with the science behind sustainable farming practices, encouraging a hands-on approach to learning and environmental stewardship.

"We are proud to continue to support Green Our Planet,†said Toni Kern, president of Las Vegas Rotary Club, a civic service organization that has been supporting Green Our Planet for the past three years. "It's more than a donation, itâ€[™]s an investment in our childrenâ€[™]s and our planet's future. Itâ€[™]s amazing what we can achieve when we come together for a common purpose."

The Las Vegas Rotary Club's donation supplied the school with 19 table-top hydroponics systems, a large commercial hydroponics system and a diverse range of curricula covering K-12 Hydroponics STEM, MS-HS Health, K-12 Financial Literacy and a culturally responsive hydroponics framework.

Kern said Green Our Planet is one of the hundreds of local organizations the club





has sponsored in recent years *(the Club raised over \$40,000 this year)* and supports its mission of teaching youth to succeed through literacy, education and life skills development.

Hydroponics is a popular method of growing produce without soil or natural lightâ€"instead using water, a nutrient solution and LED grow lights. Ideal for small spaces, hydroponic systems can be used year-round and are an easy, efficient way to grow produce without the upkeep required by a traditional garden.

Green Our Planet hosts a semi-annual student farmerâ€[™]s market where students can sell the produce they have grown throughout the year and learn valuable life skills. All profits from the farmerâ€[™]s market are re-invested into school garden programs. The next market will be held on April 19.

Duarte -- Programs Celebrating Women in Rotary

Two excellent articles were published in local newspapers in March in honor of the Duarte Clubâ€[™]s program discussing its role in inviting women to join Rotary. The Clubâ€[™]s efforts to ensure that local students understand the momentous change a small town brought about in membership worldwide was stellar. Thank you Duarte Rotary Club!

Duarte High School government class students took a page out of the community's own history to celebrate International Women's Day "Inspire Inclusion" on March 8. The community was invited to see, hear, and experience how the Duarte Rotary fought Rotary International all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court in 1987, and won, to end gender discrimination against women in service clubs. The victory opened the doors to membership for women in Rotary and all other formerly restricted all-male service clubs in the nation, and eventually, the world. That's why the Duarte Rotary is known as "The Mouse that Roared." Students revisited key arguments in the landmark Civil rights case. The program also included historic videos (linked below) and a panel of women in Rotary who discussed how being able to join Rotary years ago influenced their lives. An evening program was free and open to all on Friday, March 8 in the Duarte Performing Arts Center.
