RISE - Rotary Inspired Synergy & Excellence a huge success



Thank you to all the Presidents-Elect and District leadership team who attended the RISE event on May 17, 2025. At this event, I shared my abbreviated vision for 2025-26 with the leadership team using the three focus areas from Governor Mike's Strategic Planning Session from August 2023. Here's a summary!

Our facilitators led discussions related to Public Image, Membership Retention & Communication. Participants were asked to read the book, *Begin with We: the 10 Principles For Building & Sustaining a Culture of Excellence* by Kyle McDowell, and apply the 10 principles to our clubs and work. She is adopting WE's 5, 6 & 7 for the 2025-2026 year: WE 5) We own our own mistakes; WE 6) We pick each other up; and WE 7) We measure ourselves by our outcomes not activity. DGE Gilda's 4 C's – Camaraderie, Collaboration, Communication & Consistency are aligned with the 3 WE's. The Saturday

session was a "Think Tank" as we shared ideas from our own clubs and experiences. As we use our RI theme Unite for Good coupled with Gilda's slogan Honoring Our Legacy & Envisioning Our Future, we are ready to start the new Rotary year on July 1, 2025.

DGE Gilda shared her goals for 2025 – 2026: 15% growth in participation across all District activities such as Rotary Leadership Institute, Social media & website presence, Rotary Essentials, increase in participation in TLC/RYLA, PETS attendance. Gilda shared her vision in membership growth of 15% district wide, meaning that each of our 57 clubs achieve net 5 in growth in the next year. Net 5 can be achieved by being intentional about growth, from inviting to following up to engagement and retention and for clubs to consider sponsoring new club formats such as Rotaract clubs, Companion Clubs, Satellite Clubs and more. Zoot Velasco suggested that clubs host Membership Days. Videos from the RISE event will soon be posted on our district website. SuperBuild 2025 - A Day That Changed Lives Forever

Saturday, May 3 began in the early morning darkness at 5:30 AM in Chula Vista, where experienced builders stood shoulder to shoulder with first-timers. Excitement buzzed in the air as instructions were given and we boarded the bus, ready to embark on a life-changing journey to Tecate, Mexico.

After a quick border crossing, we made the switch from our comfortable coach to a rugged school bus—because the roads ahead were anything but smooth. That bumpy ride to the building site was the first real sign: we were entering an experience that would leave a mark on everyone involved.

When we arrived at the build site, the Corazón "blue shirts" were already waiting, joined by local community members ready

to lend a hand. After meeting the incredible family we would be building for, we quickly organized into teams. Painters began prepping the plywood, and builders got to work on the framework. The energy was electric.

By 9:30 AM, construction was in full swing—and despite a well-earned break for lunch prepared by local residents, we accomplished something extraordinary. By 4:00 PM, the house was complete.

Let that sink in: a complete home, built in just one day.











This wasn't just any shelter. The home, about 18 by 20 feet, included an asphalt-shingled roof, mesh-protected windows, a locking front door (the family's first), and a sleeping loft for the young daughter. Downstairs featured a partitioned living space, a kitchen corner with built-in shelving, and a full three-quarter bathroom. A rooftop cistern to be added for hot water, and electricity and insulation will soon follow after we leave, making the home not just livable, but safe and sustainable. These homes now cost around \$18,500—reflecting their improved quality and the expanded amenities we're able to offer. Importantly, \$600 of that goes directly toward keeping a child in high school. Many families can't afford the books and uniforms after junior high, but thanks to your support, these children now have a future. Some have even gone on to graduate from college, proof of the long-lasting impact your generosity creates.



For those of us from Nevada, the experience meant arriving the night before and staying a night after. But for our California friends, it can be a day trip: build a home in the morning and be back in your own bed by night. It's an international act of kindness that changes lives in just one day.

This year's SuperBuild was especially meaningful for me, as I pass the baton after 10 years of leading this incredible project. I'm thrilled to hand it off to **George Vieth** of the South Pasadena club and **Chelsea Scheppmann** of Henderson After Hours. With leaders in both California and Nevada, we'll broaden the reach and continue building this legacy of service. A heartfelt thank you goes out to every club that participated—whether by sending volunteers, providing financial support, or both. Special recognition to **Betty Bui** for organizing our post-build dinners the past two years, and to **David Morales** for his invaluable help. This year, approximately 10 clubs contributed, and I want to especially thank the **Las Vegas Club** for funding nearly 75% of this year's build.

Because of your generosity, we already have seed money for one home next year—and with the combined enthusiasm of George and Chelsea, I believe we can build two or even **three** homes in 2026.

Please mark your calendars: May 2, 2026 - SuperBuild returns.

Thank you for your heart, your hands, and your support. Together, we didn't just build a house in a day—we built a future.

Bridging Continents to Combat Human Trafficking: D5300's VTT Mission to Perth

From March 6 to April 2, 2025, a Vocational Training Team (VTT) from Rotary District 5300 traveled to Perth, Western Australia, to share expertise and build international partnerships in the fight against human trafficking. This dedicated team of professionals – representing law enforcement, survivor advocacy, prosecution, and education – delivered training and engaged in knowledge exchange with a wide range of Australian counterparts.

Their mission spanned Rotary District 9423, with a focus on the Perth metro area. The initiative was made possible through

the generous donation of the late Herb Hezlep, a former Monrovia Rotarian and past Group Study Exchange leader to Perth, whose legacy continues to foster educational exchange between Districts 5300 and 9423.

The team was composed of LAPD Detective Jill Calhoun; lived experience expert Brittianna Robinson of Los Angeles; former prosecutor Russell Smith and his wife Allison Smith, Educational Outreach lead for Our Rescue; and June Haskell, Director of Survivor Engagement at Our Rescue in Utah. Marilyn Diaz Walker, a retired law enforcement professional, led the team.

Throughout their three-week stay, the team delivered presentations to approximately 800 people, including members of law enforcement, prosecutors, survivor organizations, universities, and Rotary clubs. They also spoke at a Rotary District Conference, making lasting impressions on audiences eager to deepen their engagement on this urgent global issue.

"Our Rotary hosts were incredibly generous and organized a packed and purposeful itinerary," Marilyn Walker noted. "We were especially grateful to District 9423 District Governor Patricia Schraven, Rotarians David Uhe, Louise Hancock, and Rebecca Tolstoy, and above all, District Governor Michael Driebe whose vision and leadership made this mission possible."

The team's schedule involved two to three presentations most weekdays, prompting rich dialogue and encouraging ongoing collaboration---especially among academic institutions, survivor services, and prosecutors. By the final week, demand for additional presentations had outpaced the time remaining.

The impact of the VTT was profound. Audiences responded enthusiastically, with many expressing a strong desire to continue the partnerships forged during the visit. Connections with Our Rescue and other entities are already laying the groundwork for future training and joint research initiatives.

In true Rotary spirit, this VTT served as a powerful reminder of what is possible when professionals across the globe unite in service above self – turning shared concern into shared action.

Nevada Rotary Clubs Unite to Support Odyssey Charter School After Devastating Fires

Long after the media left, Rotarians did not abandon victims of the California Fires. Thanks to a \$20,000 multi-club and district grant administered by the Las Vegas Rotary Club with tremendous support from the Green Valley, Southwest, and Mesquite Rotary Clubs, Rotarians from the Las Vegas Rotary Club recently completed a heartfelt road trip to Pasadena and Altadena, California. Our mission: to deliver take home books and essential supplies to Odyssey Charter School, which suffered the loss of one campus and significant damage to another during the January wildfires.

Nearly 40% of the school's students lost their homes or were displaced due to fire and smoke damage. Several teachers and administrators were also personally affected. Children from Pre-K to grade three are currently attending school in temporary classrooms set up at the Boys and Girls Club in Pasadena. Despite the overwhelming challenges, the school's staff continue to provide a safe, nurturing learning environment.

Rotarians distributed take-home books to 200 children, offering both comfort and a sense of normalcy. One particularly moving moment came when a little girl asked, "Can I have this book? I used to have this book, but it burned down with our house. Now I'll have it again." It's a moment embedded in my heart and mind



forever.

While the visit highlighted the devastation, it also shined a light on the quiet unsung heroes, teachers and administrators, who are working tirelessly to rebuild not just classrooms, but hope. Their resilience, compassion and love for the children is deeply moving.

Through Rotary's collective efforts, a spark of joy and healing was delivered to a community still recovering, one book, one child, one act of kindness at a time. Although we supplied over \$20,000 in books and supplies, Rotarians got more back than we gave, a truly memorable day.
