Today's Presentations – Tammy Haggerty, Wounded Warrior Project

In addition to Tammy's Day job as owner of MJ Jewelers in Canton, she volunteers her time for the Wounded Warrior project. Her father, grandfather and brother are all combat veterans of various conflicts, and the project has raised \$1 million in Michigan alone, thanks to volunteers like Tammy. They also support veterans' caregivers and families, especially those with mental health issues. Wounded Warriors assist 3,547 veterans in Michigan, providing nearly \$3 million in financial wellness programs, benefit services and the 'Warriors to Work' program.

Tammy showed two very powerful videos about the Wounded Warrior Project and the diverse veteran community that they serve.

The Wounded Warrior Project (WWP) began in 2003 as a small, grassroots effort providing simple care and comfort items to the hospital bedsides of the first wounded service members returning home from the conflicts in Iraq and Afghanistan. As their post-service needs evolved, so have their programs and

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services. Today, through their direct programs in mental health, career counseling, and long-term rehabilitative care, along with their advocacy efforts, Wounded Warriors improve the lives of millions of veterans and their families.

This effort requires the passion and commitment of friends, supporters, and like-minded organizations that enable them to fulfill their mission. With their collaboration and support, Wounded Warriors strive to ensure that when those who serve come home, they're afforded every opportunity to be as successful as a civilian as they were in the military. Mark Salloum – World War 2 Documentary

In keeping with today's veteran's theme, longtime Plymouth Township resident Mark Salloum gave an update on his upcoming documentary on the many local heroes of World War 2. Mark was inspired to develop this documentary after attending Memorial Day observances in Plymouth and hearing the stories of so many vets at those events.

Mark explained how after the attack on Pearl Harbor, men of all ages answered the call and quickly enlisted. Women were also committed to the Arsenal of Democracy, building bombers in factories and providing triage in the fields. On the racial front, fearless African American men became the unsung heroes as Tuskegee Airmen and the Montford Point Marines. Sadly, less than 50,000 WWII veterans remain alive, while losing hundreds each day. And with each loss, another part of living history is gone forever. Fortunately, the stories of 25 veterans and their family members live on.

Filmmakers Mark Salloum and Keith Famie are joining forces with their new studio, Bending River Films. This film will be one of their first projects together, as it pays tribute to the brave men and women who served our country during World War II. The film takes audiences on a journey starting from the youthful days of these veterans, whether they grew up on city streets or country farms. It follows their transition to the battlefields and communications rooms where they played crucial roles in the war effort. The narrative continues to explore the challenges and triumphs veterans faced upon returning home and adjusting to civilian life.

Through the eyes of our veterans and their children, the film portrays the profound impact of war on their lives. It captures their stories of bravery, resilience, and sacrifice, offering a deep personal glimpse into the experiences of those who served.

Beyond storytelling, the film is crafted with a strong educational component aimed at informing and inspiring future generations. Mark and Ellen Elliott explained how the documentary is already being used in the Plymouth-Canton High Schools to engage students on the faces and stories of the war, and how they can research and better understand the sacrifices they made so long ago. Remember, high school students today were not born in the 20th Century and really gravitated to this interactive learning opportunity, which included marching in the Plymouth Memorial Day Parade.

Mark showed us a compelling sneak peak at the documentary, which will make its debut at the Penn Theatre in November and will air on PBS Detroit in December.

Program - Rotary Foundation Annual Meeting and Report to the Membership

Club President James introduced **Foundation President John Buzuvis**. John explained that the Foundation is a 501(c)(3) organization and is committed to using our available funds for the betterment of society both locally and internationally. John introduced the current directors. Bruce **Baxter**, **Warren Musson, Tim Joy, Kirk Kohn, Bari Livsey**, and **Gary Stolz** along with newly elected members **Jeff Stella**, **Chuck Lang** and **Todd Raska**. John also thanked outgoing members **Ed Schulz**, **Herm Theeke** and Rich **Eisiminger** for their dedication and service to the Foundation.

Special thanks and tribute were given to Past Club President, **Tom Adams** who manages the investments for the Foundation. Through the years Tom has done a magnificent job in managing the funds and growing our investments, all of which has allowed us to provide even more for grants to support Rotary causes.

John explained that the Foundation revenues come from donations from members and friends of Rotary, Walter Panse gifts, Magera Trust, Chicken BBQ, Rotary Golf Outing, and Charitable IRA donations (Required Minimum Distributions). John stated that our current Foundation Account Balance is just over \$2,000,000... John also explained how the Foundation Annual Budget is determined, which this past year was \$141,000. This number, lovingly referred to as FATS (Funds Available to Spend) is based upon a formula utilizing the past four years of spending.

This year's spending included: Memorial Scholarships, Four Way Test Essay Competition, Seedlings for elementary students, Main Street flower planting, PCCS Mental Health Fair, Salvation Army Summer Camp, Friday Night Music in the Air, Good Morning 4th of July Parade, Exchange Student sponsorship, Clean Water Projects, Days for Girls, Polio Plus, and Shelter Box and many others. In the past, we have also been major donors to The Miracle League of Plymouth.

The Centennial Projects included \$200,000 for the WSDP Radio Station upgrades as well as \$120,000 for the Rotary Park upgrades.
