Greg Birkemeyer gave a Day-10 and asked us to remember that we have fellow Rotarians who are in Ukraine we need to keep them in our thoughts and help as we can. John Lyman gave a Day-105 for being a proud graduate of Wright State and the integrity of the Athletic Program due to our speaker of the Day. Shaun Yu gave a Day-100 (PHF) for his birthday. Brian Martin gave a Day-100 for his birthday. Lisa Wagner gave a Day-100 (Lasley) for her birthday last week and to the year ahead and wishes of peace. Heath MacAlpine gave a Day-100 (PHF) for the brave people of Ukraine. Steve Naas gave a Day-10 for his brief time in the WSU Athletic Department as a student. Kathleen Carlson gave a Day-100 for being a proud graduate of Wright State. Sarah Hippensteel-Hall have a Day-50 to recognize that March is Water Month and noted the article in the District Newsletter. She also recognized that we have submitted 12 students for the Upcoming RYLA weekend and were able to fund their experience through a scholarship from the Dayton Rotary Foundation.

President Shaun then came back to the podium and thanked Sarah for all of her efforts on leading the RYLA committee. He then called the club's attention to the fact that Diane Farrell's photo had been replaced as the Membership Recruitment Director. Diane needed to step away from her board position and Lisa Grigsby has stepped up and agreed to take on Membership Recruitment for our club. Shaun then asked Andrea Wall to stand and have her red ribbon removed by Lorna Dawes. Cassie Barlow then introduced our newest member Rhonda Starghill with Girl Scouts of Western Ohio.

Bill Nance interviewed Bob Ruzinsky as our vocational profile of the month. Bob started with the Greater Dayton RTA 33 years ago as a temp. Next Generation Electric Trolleys 1.2 million a piece but will last about 20 years. Service routes can be extended as the trolley can go about 20 minutes off the wires. RTA is struggling to hire enough CDL drivers right now. They currently have so many drivers retiring at their 30-year mark (when they went county-wide) they hire 1-2 people a month but 4-6 retirements a month. When asked what he liked best about his job he loves that he knows everyone at RTA and they know him.

Chair of the Day, Adam Horseman then introduced our speaker, Bob Grant. Bob joined the Athletic Department in 1992 as the Director of Development and became the Director of Athletics in 2008. He has shifted the culture and taken the level of competition higher and higher both on the field and in the classroom. Bob is only the third AD in the history of Wright State. When he began the director the instated the mission statement for students **PSA** - People First - Student Second - Athlete Third. Happy healthy student athletes would perform better - we must value the student athletes. It is a privilege, not a right, to be a student athlete at Wright State. When asked during an interview what were the 3-4 best things he does as an athletic director: every team comes to his house for dinner, staff deliver chocolate milk to the students randomly, sophomore and senior lunches to talk to the athletes about everything but athletics - must emotionally invest in the students to make them "better at life". The athletes know that they are very available to them and that they care about them.

Wright State is at the bottom on spending but their athletes are happy and healthy. Athletes held an average of 3.179 GPA in fall 2022 and 55 consecutive terms of a 3.0 or higher departmental GPA; 86% hour-year average graduation success; 91 student athletes named to the horizon league honor roll. Students leave with soft skills that employers crave: time management, competitiveness, working with others, team work etc. Community exposure is increasing with 32 televised games and 26 million in print and online media exposure. Athletic excellence with men's basketball, baseball, golf, men's soccer, volleyball and women's basketball. Big league clubs are hiring away WSU coaches due to their excellence. Men's basketball is WSU's calling card. In 2016 a big change was made with the hiring of Scott Nagy as the coach. Grant was criticized about the hiring and was trending on Twitter as the worst athletic director ever. Bob said you can either hire the kind of people that others will covet or the kind that no one wants.

Bob then held a Wright State trivia session with prizes won by several Rotarians. Bob gave a story about how he got his Twitter handle and how his Twitter career was launched with the hashtag #uhyeah . Students will be recognized personally with an #uhyeah and they know that that is a signal for them to come see and they get a t-shirt that isn't available anywhere else.

Shaun thanked Bob for his entertaining presentation and then encouraged everyone to be in attendance next week.
